- 2 the meeting to order.
- This is the Citizens Clean Elections Commission
- 4 meeting, Thursday, May 18th, 9:30 a.m. We have an agenda
- 5 here. So we have, I, call to order, and we have done
- 6 that.
- 7 II, discussion and possible action on Commission
- 8 minutes for April 20, 2017 and April 27, 2017.
- 9 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Mr. Chairman.
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner. 10
- COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: I move we approve the
- 12 minutes for the meetings of April 20th, 2017 and April 27,
- **13** 2017.
- 14 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. There is a motion. Is
- 15 there a second?
- 16 COMMISSIONER PATON: Second.
- 17 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. We have got a second.
- 18 All in favor say eye.
- 19 (A chorus of ayes.)
- 20 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Opposed.
- 21 (No response.)
- 22 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Abstained.
- 23 (No response.)
- 24 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Motion passed unanimously.
- 25 So next we go to the Executive Director's

- 1 September 11th. That issue principally has to do with
- 2 whether or not, you know, Legacy Foundation can get back
- 3 into court, having failed to take action within the time
- 4 allotted for their appeal of the administrative order.
- A couple of other news items I just want to real
- 6 quickly mention before we move on to page 2. You know,
- the Republic has reported that the County Recorder's
- Office has begun processing state voter registration forms
- that may not have provided proof of citizenship on them as
- statute appears to require. There is a link in your
- materials which you can read the story at your, at your
- leisure. I will mention that, you know, why does that
- 13 matter to clean elections, it is really for, two reasons.
- One, under current thinking of the -- well, I
- shouldn't say current. Under the thinking of the
- Secretary of State's Office and the Attorney General's
- Office, heretofore, a person who uses a state form that
- did not provide proof of citizenship wasn't eligible to
- 19 sign a candidate petition or give a qualifying
- contribution. So how this plays into that will be of some
- 21 importance.
- Additionally, from a voter education perspective
- 23 is, if we are going to have one county that does things
- 24 one way and it is not clear what the other counties are
- 25 going to do, we are going to want to be able to be

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- 1 consistent about what we tell folks what they are required
- 2 to bring as far as voter registration requirements.
- We right now operate in a bifurcated system
- 4 where, because as a result of a federal litigation, folks
- 5 who use the federal postcard form promulgated by the
- 6 Election Assistance Commission, which requires them to
- 7 attest to their citizenship, are registered for federal
- 8 elections but not for state elections. And so there is a
- **9** bifurcated process there.
- What the Recorder in Maricopa County is doing, 10
- 11 at least according to the news reports, is adopting a
- 12 position that he can use a state form, which is a
- 13 different form and not a form that was subject to
- 14 litigation I just described, or that we defended, I should
- 15 say, in the litigation I just described -- and by we I
- 16 mean when I was at the AG's office -- and looking up and
- 17 sort of checking and seeing if those folks are in fact
- The legal issue, as I described as briefly as I 19
- 20 could in the note there, is A.R.S. 166 -- A.R.S. 16-166
- 21 says that if sufficient proof or evidence is not provided,
- 22 the County Recorder is to reject that. So there is a
- 23 question about whether or not -- you know, what does that
- 24 mean and what flexibility is there. So, you know, we do
- 25 have something to keep our eye on.

- 1 filed on that. You know, we will keep you updated to the
- 2 extent that's something that is of interest to you all as
- 3 we go forward.
- But that's the news, as it were. Unless anyone
- 5 has any questions, that completes my report.
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioners, any questions
- 7 for Director Collins?
- 8 (No response.)
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Director Collins, I have a
- 10 question for you. You write in your report that Recorder
- 11 Fontes is exploring going through mail only elections --
- 12 MR. COLLINS: Sure.
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: -- in 2017. Are there other 13
- 14 jurisdictions that follow that procedure?
- MR. COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, Commissioners, so as 15
- 16 you can see from the earlier part of the report, some
- jurisdictions are already in all mail elections. The
- Recorder's Office has been building towards -- Mr. Fontes
- made an announcement about this on television about, I
- want to say, a month and a half ago that he would like to
- see Maricopa County go to all mail elections. Gina and
- Alec and I attended an informational session with the
- 23 Recorder's Office last week on that. And I think that we
- are talking about 2017. So they are still in the process
- 25 of, in Maricopa, of ascertaining how many, how many

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- I will note since this was produced, the League
- 2 of Women of Voters, Rivko, can't be here today but wanted
- 3 me to mention to you that the League believes that what
- 4 Recorder Fontes is doing is appropriate. We haven't taken
- 5 a position on it. I have -- you can read the story and
- 6 see where different attorneys are, you know. I certainly
- 7 have my experience from when I worked on this issue at the
- 8 AG's office, and others of course who have worked on this
- 9 issue may have their views, but that's in flux.
- I also added late, you will see in the back of 10
- 11 your packet, a note about a story that came out about the
- 12 legal standard for initiative petitions, which I think we
- 13 will want to keep our eye on. Although the Commission
- 14 itself is not in the process of doing initiatives, we do 15 come out of an initiative. And the legislature passed the
- 16 law this past year that says that initiative petitions
- 17 will be reviewed under what is called a strict compliance
- 18 standard.
- 19 That standard means that basically, to
- 20 oversimplify, any error in the process would result
- 21 potentially in those petitions or certain sheets being
- 22 tossed out. It is a different standard that applies to
- 23 candidate petitions. And it is the same standard that 24 applies to referendum petitions and, I believe, recall
- 25 petitions. So there is some litigation that has been

- 1 jurisdictions are affected.
- And what mail only really means is not so much
- 3 that you have to mail back your ballot but it will simply
- 4 mean that, you know, you will have essentially ballot
- centers where you would deliver your early ballot to a, to
- a fixed location in addition to mail it. So right now,
- you know, all of, a really high percentage, I don't have
- 8 an exact figure but somewhere in the, around 80 percent of
- 9 folks, are, you know, participate by mail in some way,
- 10 either because they vote their ballot and mail it back or
- 11 they vote their ballot and bring it to a ballot polling
- 12 place on election day. The contours of this plan on a
- 13 countywide basis would be to create ballot centers where
- 14 folks who have gotten their ballots could come in and drop
- them off in addition to having the option to mail them in,
- which they always have.
- 17 So we are there in part because, like any
- jurisdiction, we try to supplement the voter education
- 19 efforts that they make and so, you know, we have -- we
- will be, as the county, like all jurisdictions go through,
- 21 sort of fleshing this out. We will be working to see how
- 22 we can, on a cost efficient basis, ensure that folks have,
- 23 you know, good information about how this is going to work
- 24 and whether or not it is going to -- and how they can get
- 25 their ballot back and counted.

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- We are not really in a posture to take a
- 2 position on how the Recorder or the individual
- 3 jurisdictions want to run their elections. You know,
- 4 Phoenix, for example, runs its own election system, you
- **5** know, separately. That's not really our interest or role.
- 6 Our role is more in terms of ensuring that whatever
- 7 jurisdictions are doing, you know, we are ensuring that
- 8 our voter education materials are, you know, consistent
- 9 with that so folks are getting good information and have a
- 10 source that they can go to that gives accurate
- 11 information.
- So we are tracking that and in conversations
- 13 with them related to that. And we will see how that goes
- **14** moving forward.
- 15 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Thank you, Mr. Collins.
- 16 COMMISSIONER PATON: Mr. Chairman, I have a
- 17 question.
- 18 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Paton.
- 19 COMMISSIONER PATON: So I presume the reason for
- 20 this is cost efficiency.
- 21 MR. COLLINS: Yeah. Mr. Chairman, Commissioner
- 22 Paton, I believe that's right. I think that, if you can
- 23 get to a place where you have, where you have ballot
- 24 centers that are effective and laid out in a way that
- 25 are -- that works for voters, you should be able to see

- 1 You know, the manpower, person power associated with
- 2 manning those polling places is an issue. On the other
- 3 hand, you know, there are folks who believe that that's
- 4 just part of the process and ought to be. So we are right
- 5 now in a position where we are, again, weighing in on the
- 6 policy question.
- 7 COMMISSIONER PATON: So our, I mean our concern
- 8 is that it is fair for everybody.
- 9 MR. COLLINS: Right. Our concern, right, our
- 10 concern is voters get -- I am sorry.
- 11 Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Paton, our concern is
- 12 that, whatever happens in Maricopa County and statewide in
- 13 2017 that, when folks come to the Clean Elections website
- 14 or look at Clean Elections produced voter education
- 15 materials, that they are getting accurate information
- 16 about how they can vote in this election.
- 17 COMMISSIONER PATON: Thank you.
- 18 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any further questions,
- **19** Commissioners?
- 20 (No response.)
- 21 CHAIRMAN TITLA: If not, why don't we go on to
- 22 the next item, IV, discussion and possible action and
- 23 final comprehensive audit approval of Jesus Rubalcava,
- 24 participating candidates for 2016 election cycle.
- 25 MR. COLLINS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. And I

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- 1 some cost savings as a county.
- 2 The 2017 is not a full scale, you know,
- 3 statewide election or consolidated election dates in 2017,
- 4 but they are not, you know, we are not talking about, you
- 5 know, sort of -- it is a good year, I mean if you are
- 6 going to do this quickly, which Recorder Fontes clearly is
- 7 doing in the sense that he has announced he wants to do
- 8 this and is moving forward in this calendar year, the
- **9** benefit of that is potentially cost savings. The benefit
- 10 of doing it in an election year that's off county, off
- 11 state is the scope should be lower to see if it, if it is
- 12 something that works, so...
- 13 COMMISSIONER PATON: Like the State of Oregon, I
- 14 believe, is all mail.
- MR. COLLINS: That is correct. And over time,
- 16 you know, I think there is a sense, and I don't want to
- 17 speak for all of the county election officials because I
- 18 certainly can't, but my impression has been that, you
- 19 know, generally speaking, most county election directors
- 20 and recorders are favorably disposed towards mail
- 21 elections in one form or another because of the cost
- 22 savings.
- 23 If you think about precinct based elections, you
- 24 know, you are talking about deploying hundreds of machines
- 25 all over the place, and the equipment itself has costs.

- 1 will mention real quickly I believe Representative
- 2 Rubalcava is on the telephone. And he will be, I guess,
- 3 available to answer questions and/or talk to you in a
- 4 moment
- 5 I wanted to preface my comments by saying, you
- 6 know, we have the auditors, independent auditors who
- 7 performed this audit are here, Kevin Camberg and Jill
- 8 Foley. They are here in the audience in case you have
- 9 technical questions about the audit itself. Sara is
- 10 obviously here and has been overseeing the audit.
- Just to put the audit in context, after our
- 12 primary random audits, we had what we deemed were
- 13 sufficient questions about some of the accounting there to
- 14 do a full audit. The question before you today is
- 15 acceptance of the audit, which is really to say you accept
- 16 that the audit has been performed. There may be other
- 17 things that come out of this audit. But those are a
- 18 separate question that's not before you today. The
- 19 question before you is the audit itself. Any questions
- 20 you may have about it, there are other, there are other
- 21 issues that may develop out of this audit, but those
- 22 aren't in front of you today.
- 23 The way we felt the best way to proceed was to
- 24 review the audit on its own terms and then any subsequent
- 25 actions that, you know, I may recommend or may come up

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- 1 with would be in a separate context. We believe that's
- 2 the most appropriate way to proceed.
- 3 I don't have very much to add beyond what Sara
- 4 has written in the memo, other than to say that, you know,
- 5 there are some issues with, well, accounting and inflows
- 6 and outflows into accounts, among other things.
- 7 Mr. Rubalcava had an opportunity to review this audit and
- 8 respond to it, and that response is incorporated into the
- 9 audit.
- 10 We are simply asking for you to approve the
- 11 audit. And I don't really have much to add beyond that.
- 12 If you have questions for either Mr. Camberg or Ms. Foley
- 13 or for Sara, they are here. And then, of course, I think
- 14 Mr. Rubalcava is on the line if he -- if you have
- 15 questions for him or if he wants to address the Commission
- 16 in some kind of way.
- But, again, the issue here is not to do, or not
- 18 do a thing with respect to Mr. Rubalcava's status or in
- 19 any kind of -- but, rather, to just deal with the audit
- 20 itself, and other questions that may be implicit in this
- 21 audit will be dealt with in another process, another
- 22 proceeding.
- 23 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioners, any questions?
- 24 COMMISSIONER PATON: Mr. Chairman.
- 25 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Paton.

- 1 Director to file an internal complaint in an appropriate
- 2 time that then will get its own separate response from the
- 3 candidate or -- and then that would -- that, and then
- 4 assuming that happens, which it hasn't yet, that hasn't
- 5 been done --
- 6 COMMISSIONER PATON: Correct.
- 7 MR. COLLINS: -- but assuming that that happens,
- 8 that candidate then has the right to, you know, respond to
- 9 an internal complaint to -- if that internal complaint
- 10 leads to a reason to believe memorandum, the candidate has
- 11 a right to appear at that proceeding and provide further
- 12 information.
- 13 Subsequent to that, there is, assuming that
- 14 there are three votes for reason to believe, there is an
- 15 investigative process, after which there is briefing
- 16 where, you know, where the Commission will be briefed, but
- 17 the candidate will have an opportunity to brief the
- **18** Commission. And that will be an independent decision by
- **19** the Commission.
- 20 Subsequent to that, if that were to, if that --
- 21 if the Commission were to find probable cause and impose
- 22 penalties, the candidate has the opportunity to go to the
- 23 administrative office, administrative hearing office.
- 24 That then comes back to the Commission and subsequently it
- 25 goes to Superior Court.

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- 1 COMMISSIONER PATON: So the auditors are here.
- 2 MR. COLLINS: Yes.
- 3 COMMISSIONER PATON: Would they be back at a
- 4 different time before any actions were taken?
- 5 I don't know the procedures for this. I mean
- 6 they are here. Maybe they -- is this appropriate for them
- 7 to say certain things about explaining it to us? I mean
- 8 there are pages and pages here.
- 9 MR. COLLINS: Right.
- 10 COMMISSIONER PATON: And of course I am not a
- **11** CPA.
- MR. COLLINS: Fair. Mr. Chairman.
- 13 COMMISSIONER PATON: So I don't know what your,
- 14 the whole scheme of this is.
- 15 MR. COLLINS: No, fair question.
- 16 COMMISSIONER PATON: That's my concern, I guess.
- MR. COLLINS: Fair question, Commissioner Paton
- 18 and -- Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Paton. The way I would
- 19 put it is like this. And I don't know if either Sara or
- ${\bf 20}\,$ any of the others would want to talk about what the audit
- 21 process was.
- The distinction I am trying to draw is between a
- 23 post audit, you know, putting aside this, any -- doesn't
- 24 matter. Let's talk about any candidate at this juncture
- 25 in the cycle. The statute puts the onus on the Executive

- 1 COMMISSIONER PATON: So I guess, Mr. Chairman,
- $\boldsymbol{2}\ \ \text{if I may, I mean we have Mr. Rubalcava here. He made an}$
- 3 effort to get on the phone.
- MR. COLLINS: Right.
- 5 COMMISSIONER PATON: And so at the very least, I
- 6 think we should hear from him.
- 7 MR. COLLINS: Sure.
- 8 COMMISSIONER PATON: And then if you don't think
- 9 it is needed for us to listen to the auditors now, then I
- 10 just think that, number one, the other Commissioners, if
- 11 we think that's a good idea to hear from them now --
- MR. COLLINS: Right, right.
- 13 COMMISSIONER PATON: -- but at the very least we
- 14 need to make the effort to listen to Mr. Rubalcava while
- 15 he is here.
- MR. COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Paton,
- 17 I would agree with both of those things. In fact, if you
- 18 all are comfortable sort of talking about what the audit
- 19 process is, and then, Mr. Chairman, if you were to, you
- 20 know, turn it over to Mr. Rubalcava to make whatever
- 21 statement, I think we could do both those things so
- 22 everyone understands what an audit is, you know, what the
- 23 difference between an audit is and all these other 24 procedural steps I outlined for you.
- 25 COMMISSIONER PATON: All right. Thank you.

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- 1 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Why dont we have Sara
- 2 start.
- 3 Sara, can you explain what you did.
- 4 MS. LARSEN: Good morning, Chairman,
- 5 Commissioners. So our independent auditors, Fester &
- **6** Chapman, are here today. They conducted the primary
- 7 random audit of Mr. Rubalcava when he was selected, I
- 8 believe, last September. And because of the findings in
- 9 that audit that we presented to you, we had some concerns.
- 10 So we asked them to do a full audit, which was an
- 11 item-by-item review of the campaign finance reports and
- 12 bank statements.
- So the audit is included in the summary that I
- **14** provided to you. And it is pretty in depth. I have also
- 15 done a fairly in depth memo on the background, the
- 16 summary, and any potential violations from the findings of
- 17 the auditors. And that memo was directed to you and to
- 18 Tom, because Tom is the one who has the ability, if he
- 19 sees fit, for any of those violations, to do an internal
- 20 complaint.
- 21 So right now it is just highlighting the things
- 22 that were found in the audit. And Jill Foley and Kevin
- 23 Camberg are here. They were the ones that had contact
- 24 with Mr. Rubalcava and requested the documentation from
- 25 him.

- 1 items over Christmas break where he had stored them at his
- 2 job at the school district. So this is more or less a

- 4 then a cross-referencing to what he reported on his
- 5 campaign finance reports.
- And, you know, she really tied it together. We
- 7 just basically listed out everything that was in the
- 8 statements and summarized them and tried to categorize
- 9 them; although, with no support, they were possible
- 10 personal use or possible campaign use without support
- 11 behind it. So really what you have in our report is a
- 12 very comprehensive summary, but I believe Sara summarized
- 13 our large summary into something that's useable hopefully
- 14 for you.
- 15 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any questions, Commissioners?
- 16 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Mr. Chairman.
- 17 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Kimble.
- **18** COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: This is an overly
- 19 simplistic question from a non-CPA. But I have read this
- 20 several times. And I guess my bottom line question is:
- 21 Is there any evidence of campaign funds used for personal
- 22 noncampaign expenses, or are you unable to answer that
- 23 question because of the lack of records?
- MR. CAMBERG: The latter. We really, I can't
- 25 really speak to it, other than we summarized what appears

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- 1 No documentation was provided throughout this
- 2 process. So they utilized -- well, he did provide his
- 3 bank statements. So they utilized his bank statements and
- 4 campaign finance reports to ascertain which items had been
- 5 reported, which items had not been reported, which items
- 6 were potentially campaign expenses, even though there was
- 7 no documentation provided for those, and which items were8 possibly personal use expenditures, and to really give us
- 9 an overview of what happened in the bank accounts. So
- 10 they did, they did that.
- 11 They did some pretty in depth spreadsheets and I
- 12 tried to provide a summary of that in my summary. But if
- 13 you have any questions, I am happy to answer those.
- 14 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any questions for Sara,
- **15** Commissioners?
- 16 (No response.)
- 17 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Thank you, Sara.
- 18 And can we hear from Fester & Chapman, PC?
- MR. CAMBERG: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 20 I don't have too much to add. She did a great
- 21 job of summarizing. Just the overall, normally we would
- 22 have done more work as far as there was no supporting
- 23 documentation. He wasn't, Mr. Rubalcava wasn't able to
- 24 locate the supporting documentation subsequent to -- as
- 25 you can see in his response, they had, someone moved his

- 1 to be campaign related and what appeared to not be in the
- 2 summary pages. But without the supporting documentation,
- 3 it is not a -- it is just our estimation; it is not based
- 4 on actual invoices.
- 5 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Mr. Chairman.
- 6 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Chan.
- 7 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Mr. Chairman and -- I am
- 8 sorry. I do not know your name.
- 9 MR. CAMBERG: I am Kevin Camberg.
- 10 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Kevin Camberg, Mr. Camberg.
- 11 You know, I am not a CPA either. And I am just curious.
- 12 Have you participated in these types of audits before? I
- 13 wasn't sure if your firm had. You are the firm that does
- 14 these?
- MR. CAMBERG: Yes, we have been engaged over
- 16 the years, the normal campaign audit. And we have had, I
- 17 think this is our second comprehensive audit that we have
- **18** completed over the years.
- 19 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Okay. Thank you.
- 20 And I don't know if this is actually a good
- 21 question for you or maybe for Sara, not to put anybody on
- 22 the spot too much. But, for example, in, and this is
- 23 actually from Sara's memo, which I think did pull
- 24 everything together beautifully, there are quite a few, I
- 25 think there are 16 noncampaign withdrawals that were

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- 1 identified. And, again, you know, without support from
- 2 Mr. Rubalcava, it is difficult to know. But, for example,
- 3 just the overdraft fees, which is noted were numerous,
- 4 would those be considered a noncampaign expense or could
- 5 they ever be considered a campaign expense, do you know?
- 6 MR. CAMBERG: That's, statute would drive that.
- 7 Sara can speak to that.
- 8 MS. LARSEN: Chairman, Commissioner Chan, those
- 9 would be a noncampaign expenses. Participating candidates
- 10 are not required to go into debt, so having an overdraft
- 11 fee out of your bank account would make the assumption
- 12 that there was not funds in there to adequately support
- 13 whatever expenditure had been made. But without
- 14 documentation, again, for all the expenditures, it is hard
- 15 to align what was a campaign expense and what was a
- 16 personal expense. But I think that there are some fairly
- 17 obvious expenditures in there that would say that they
- 18 were personal expenditures rather than campaign
- 19 expenditures.
- 20 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Okay.
- 21 COMMISSIONER PATON: Are you going to continue?
- 22 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Well, Mr. Chairman, Sara, I
- 23 just wanted to say thank you. And I know today we are
- 24 just here voting on whether to accept the audit, and I
- 25 just was curious. Out of the 16 listed, you know,

- 1 on.
- 2 MR. COLLINS: Well, he came on early and then he
- 3 left. I don't know if he is going to come back or not.
- 4 CHAIRMAN TITLA: I thought he came on. Okay.
- 5 MR. COLLINS: He was on.
- 6 COMMISSIONER PATON: He was on and then he left.
- 7 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Excuse me. Go ahead.
- 8 MS. LARSEN: It's okay, thank you, Chairman.
- 9 Commissioner Paton, the \$9,209.72 that the
- 10 auditors found in the bank accounts, that was an amount
- 11 that was not reported on the campaign finance reports. So
- 12 we know that there was -- that's an aggregate of
- 13 expenditures that were made out of the bank account that
- 14 were not identifiable on the campaign finance reports.
- 15 So expenditures happened out of the campaign
- 16 bank account that were not reported. So that was a
- 17 failure to report.
- 18 COMMISSIONER PATON: But that amount is what we
- 19 are concerned about? Any other amounts? I guess I get
- 20 confused.
- 21 MS. LARSEN: So --
- 22 COMMISSIONER PATON: Maybe I shouldn't be in the
- 23 weeds in here on all of this. I am just trying to
- 24 understand.
- MR. COLLINS: If I could, Mr. Chairman,

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- 1 noncampaign expenditures, I can see why we believe or you
- 2 believe or the CPAs believe they were noncampaign related,
- 3 because many of them are out-of-town, for example, trips.
- 4 It seems to be associated. And I don't want to get too
- 5 much into the nitty-gritty if, you know, if that's better
- 6 reserved for another time. But I just was curious about
- 7 that.
- 8 So thank you. And I am done.
- 9 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Paton.
- 10 COMMISSIONER PATON: So I mean, as not being a
- 11 CPA and just trying to do math and so on, what it comes
- 12 down to is \$9,209 and change hasn't been found to be
- 13 documentation for it or campaign expenses. We have
- 14 documentation of the amount of money from clean elections,
- 15 is that correct, or -- I am on page 3 of your memorandum,
- 16 of the memorandum.
- 17 (A telephonic disturbance occurred.)
- 18 MS. LARSEN: Chairman, Commissioner Paton, the
- 19 \$9.000 --
- 20 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Sara, one moment.
- 21 Mr. Rubalcava?
- 22 (No response.)
- 23 COMMISSIONER CHAN: I believe he left the
- 24 meeting, Mr. Chairman.
- 25 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Oh, he left? I thought he came

- 1 Commissioner Paton, I think the way I would summarize it
- 2 is this, that there are, based on what the auditors have
- 3 been unable to ascertain as final numbers, there are
- 4 substantial questions about virtually every expenditure,
- 5 whether they be campaign, personal or otherwise, that
- 6 occurred in this campaign.
- 7 COMMISSIONER PATON: So above, there are all
- 8 kinds of questions besides what I just asked.
- 9 (A telephonic disturbance occurred.)
- 10 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Do you have any more questions
- 11 for Sara, Commissioners?
- 12 (No response.)
- 13 CHAIRMAN TITLA: If not, I have a question
- **14** for --
- 15 MS. THOMAS: Chairman, one moment, please.
- 16 Can you identify yourself from the phone,
- 17 please.
- 18 REPRESENTATIVE RUBALCAVA: Yes. This is
- 19 Representative Jesus Rubalcava. I dropped off and then I
- 20 just came back on.
- 21 MS. THOMAS: Okay. Thank you, sir. We are
- 22 still in session. One moment.
- 23 REPRESENTATIVE RUBALCAVA: Thank you.
- 24 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioners, this is a
- 25 reminder this is just the beginning of the process. And

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- 1 today we are asked to accept or not accept the audit, I
- 2 guess. And Mr. Rubalcava is on the line now, so he may
- 3 choose to respond or make a statement or, say, maybe
- 4 submit some needed documentation or something.
- 5 But we have a letter from Fester & Chapman, PC,
- 6 dated April 28th, 2017. And the signature is Fester &
- 7 Chapman, PC. Are you the one that signed it?
- 8 MR. CAMBERG: I am.
- 9 CHAIRMAN TITLA: You put Fester & Chapman, PC?
- MR. CAMBERG: We signed it with the name of our
- 11 firm, correct.
- 12 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. And in the last, the
- 13 next to last paragraph you put down we were not engaged to
- 14 and did not conduct an examination, the objective of which
- 15 would be the expression of an opinion on the comprehensive
- **16** audit and review of the finance activity of Rubalcava for
- 17 House, is that correct?
- MR. CAMBERG: Yes, because technically what we
- 19 are doing is an agreed upon procedure. It is not a
- 20 financial statement audit, and that's what that paragraph
- 21 is referring to.
- 22 CHAIRMAN TITLA: And, accordingly, you said that
- 23 we do express such an opinion, is that correct?
- MR. CAMBERG: That's correct.
- 25 CHAIRMAN TITLA: So, additionally, you say that

- 1 So, essentially, under R2-20-406 you are
- 2 required to simply acknowledge the audit has been
- 3 completed. Actions to be taken subsequent that may be
- 4 based in part on the audit are handled pursuant to
- **5** R2-20-200 series. And that's referenced in R2-20-405.
- 6 So the approval is, in effect, to say that the
- 7 work was done and the subsequent actions that the
- 8 Commission may take via staff and itself are a jumping off
- 9 point that the rules contemplate after the acceptance of
- 10 the audit by the Commission and the forwarding the final
- 11 audit to the candidate after this meeting, assuming you
- 12 all approve it.
- 13 Does that make sense?
- 14 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Yeah. Thank you for the
- 15 clarification, Director Collins.
- 16 Anymore questions, Commissioners?
- 17 MR. CAMBERG: Mr. Chairman, I would just like to
- 18 add we don't give an opinion. We provide information. It
- 19 is for your -- the Commission to decide how to act upon
- 20 that information.
- 21 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Thank you. Now, in this
- 22 process that we are in, if you were engaged to conduct an
- 23 examination for an opinion, could you express an opinion?
- MR. CAMBERG: Yes. That would be a different
- 25 engagement, but yeah, yes; although, it wouldn't be a

1 financial statement. Audit opinion involves GAAP

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- 1 this report that you submitted to us today is intended
- 2 solely for the information and use of the Citizens Clean
- 3 Election Commission, is that correct?
- 4 MR. CAMBERG: That is correct.
- 5 CHAIRMAN TITLA: And it is not to be used for
- 6 any other purpose, is that correct?
- 7 MR. CAMBERG: Yes, because of the engagement,
- 8 how the engagement letter is worded.
- 9 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Now, based upon those
- 10 statements, how do we accept or not accept the document do 11 you think?
- MR. CAMBERG: Well, it is intended for the
- 13 Commission's use.
- MR. COLLINS: So if I may, Mr. Chairman.
- 15 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Director Collins.
- MR. COLLINS: Mr. Chairman, pursuant to our
- 17 audit rules, following an audit report, the audit may
- 18 identify issues that weren't a referral for possible
- 19 enforcement procedures. That's what Sara's memo
- 20 essentially summarizes for my purposes. And then the
- 21 rules say the Commission will consider the final audit
- 22 report in an open meeting, which is what we are currently
- 23 doing. We are to provide the candidate with copies, which24 we have done. And then following the approval of the
- 25 final audit report, we will forward it to the candidate.

- 4 Again, the question, if you want to, out of
- 5 deference to Commissioner Meyer, wait until he is here to
- 6 vote, that is your discretion.
- 7 I will also say one other caveat is that,
- 8 because these rules are tailored to clean elections
- 9 funding, they cannot affect anyone's use of seed money or
- other contributions that they are receiving that are 10
- permitted that are not clean funding. And what that means 11
- 12 is that, if you were to vote and it wasn't unanimous, it
- wouldn't be effective until January 1, but no one will be 13
- 14 receiving clean money until January 1. So there is no
- 15 prejudice to anyone if there is not a vote today.
- 16 So all that having been said, I think it is
- 17 imperative that the folks who are here, particularly the
- 18 state representatives who are here, have taken time out of
- their day to testify are here and can talk to you, and you 19
- 20 can engage with them about their opinions about this, and
- 21 then we have that on the record going forward. And then
- at that point you all can make, you know, a judgment among 22
- 23 yourselves about how you want to proceed in view of
- Commissioner Meyer's absence. If you want to proceed 24
- today, tomorrow, that's really a discussion for you all to

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- 1 Mr. Collins.
- MR. COLLINS: Yes. Chairman Titla, I want to 2
- preface this in a couple different ways. First, as is
- apparent, Commissioner Meyer was unable to attend today's 4
- 5 meeting because of a conflict that was unmovable. So two
- 6 thoughts.
- 7 One, it is really your discretion in terms of
- 8 the, as the Commission, to adopt or not adopt these rules
- 9 today. The way the statute works is we have to circulate
- them for 60 days. But that doesn't mean after 60 days, 10
- 11 you know, you must vote on them or not vote on them. So
- 12 if it is the Commission's judgment to not -- to wait until
- 13 Commissioner Meyer is available, that's reasonable.
- However, that having been said, we have at least 14
- 15 one, two, three, four, five people here who do want to
- testify on these rules. And we haven't gotten a lot of 16
- 17 written public comments, so this will be the bulk of our
- 18 public comment. And I think that what we want to do,
- 19 whether we vote on this today, is get that public comment,
- 20 make sure you all have it, if you don't vote on it today,
- give you time to digest it. We will also have minutes for 21
- 22 you for you to review before the next meeting.
- 23 So we have three representatives from the House
- 24 of Representatives who are here -- or two or three -- two
- representatives who have taken time out of their day to

- make. 1
- 2 And then obviously there are policy decisions
- 3 within the A, B, and C choices for party interaction.
- Just to -- the 30,000 foot view is A is sort of a ban on 4
- 5 the use of clean money with parties. B is a, you know,
- 6 mailing lists and admissions to events at \$200 or less.
- 7 And then C is a different approach, a more comprehensive
- 8 approach that essentially creates a prophylactic for both
- 9 candidates and, frankly, party, and we have the exact same
- 10 language for consultants, to ensure that folks are
- 11 documenting things and have something to hold over their,
- whether through their consultant or a party staffer that 12
- they are paying for services to say, look, we need to have 13
- 14 this documented so that, you know, when and if, you know,
- 15 there is an audit, you have, hey, boom, here it is, here
- is what we got, here is what we paid, here is what it is. 16
- So there are three, under the party issue, there are three 17
- 18 distinct approaches.
- 19 And then the third one is paralleled with the
- 20 consultant approach, because, in my personal view,
- different -- Commissioners may have different views about 21
- 22 this, but my personal view is that a consultant with
- 23 multiple candidates under his or her umbrella is not
- different substantially from a party with multiple 24
- candidates under his or her umbrella because of the 25

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- ability to -- to the same issues with respect to is money
- going here, there, or anywhere is going to happen. Not 2
- everyone may share that view, but, practically speaking, 3
- 4 once you have one entity that everybody is working with,
- you know, you have got, you have similar issues. Now,
- 6 different people have different views about what parties
- 7 are, and that's a separate question, so...
- 8 That's all my preface. So I would,
- 9 Mr. Chairman, recommend, if you are comfortable with this,
- turn -- you know, we have four or five people to testify. 10
- And, you know, you are free to ask them questions about, 11
- 12 you know, what they think and what their -- I don't -- you
- 13 know, what their positions are on things. And then we can
- 14 go from there, if that works for you.
- 15 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. If it is okay with the
- 16 Commissioners, I would suggest that we hear from these
- 17 people. And we have a couple representatives. Why don't
- 18 we hear from the honorable representatives then.

- Commission could or could not argue, that the seed money
- 3 is technically private money since that's not coming from
- 4 public funds. But when I use the party services, which I
- 5 did use services rendered by the party, I used the voter
- 6 file purchased by the party in an app that the party had
- 7 to help digest that information, that made our canvass or
- 8 door-to-door efforts incredibly successful to have that on
- 9 us.
- 10 But the seed money, as it stands, has to be
- 11 spent in the primary election. So going on into the
- 12 general election, I would have no, I guess you could say,
- seed funds and private funds to be able to contract and 13
- have some services provided by my party. Specifically
- 15 that's when, the general election, that's when I use party
- 16 services.
- 17 The firm that we worked with in the primary
- election had just enough capacity to help us over the hump 18
- 19 for the primary elections, but when the general election
- 20 came and you have all these other ballot priorities and
- 21 candidates, they could not work with us. The only vendor
- that we had that we trusted and knew would provide a 22
- 23 quality product when promoting myself as a candidate for
- District 26 was the party. And they did a phenomenal job. 24
- They helped us reach doors that we just could not reach on

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- concerned and watching. 1
- So after reviewing the three rules, I want to 2
- 3 make it very clear that if Option A or Option B were to
- pass, if the Commission were to adopt these rules, I would 4
- 5 have to seriously reconsider whether or not I would run as
- 6 a clean elections candidate in the future.
- 7 For me clean elections was not only the most
- 8 viable choice, it was the choice that most closely aligned
- 9 with my ideology. I believe that elections and candidates
- and elected officials should be advocating for the public, 10
- 11 should be focused on the voters in their district. And
- 12 that's what clean elections empowered me to do.
- 13 In my race, I spent my time fundraising, talking to my voters, asking for the small dollar contributions. 14
- 15 My district fortunately has been electing clean election
- candidates for the past ten years, I guess going on to 11, 16
- 17 12, you know, in this upcoming cycle. So this is
- 18 something that, you know, you go to our meetings and
- 19 people ask are you running clean and something that our
- 20 voters value.
- 21 My fear with Option A and B is that cutting
- 22 ties, cutting me off as a candidate affiliated with the
- 23 Democratic party, cutting me off from my party's services,
- 24 the services that they can render, hinders my ability to
- 25 be a competitive candidate.

- a volunteer basis. We needed paid staff to do that. And
- for me, the background that I come is very, and the
- 3 campaigns I run, is very intensive on door-to-door,
- 4 face-to-face contact with voters.
- 5 And for me, Option C makes the most sense. My
- only concern with Option C -- so, I am a fan of
- 7 transparency. That's the other thing that I think is
- 8 beautiful about clean elections. Because I get the 4,000
- 9 seed money, and then I get the 300 \$5 contributions, and
- that's matched by, through clean election funding, every 10
- 11 single reporting period you don't have to worry about did
- a PAC just drop a check right before the deadline. So you 12 don't know. Right? Like it is very transparent. People,
- my voters know this reporting deadline doesn't matter 14
- 15 because she got her money clean. And to me that's very important. 16
- 17 But Option C, so, makes the most sense because I
- 18 do believe in transparency. And I think we could improve
- 19 clean elections and the reporting processes. And I think
- 20 the public should know. Like if the public, if my voters,
- if other people want to see like exactly how the money is 21
- 22 being spent, that's great.
- 23 My concern is I believe in there it talks about
- when you can pay for services rendered. And during our
 - primary election, we did work with a small firm that

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- 1 specializes in door-to-door contact voter engagement. And
- 2 had we not been able to pay them up front, they probably
- 3 couldn't have worked with us because they are a small
- 4 local business.
- 5 And so my concern right now is, with the warning
- 6 around that portion, I encourage you guys to relook at
- 7 that, because my fear is that a small Arizona local
- 8 business would not have the capacity or the means to work
- 9 with clean elections candidates in the future, which would
- 10 narrow our choices when we are trying to contract for
- 11 services with the vendors who are out there.
- I feel like I covered most of my points. I am,
- 13 I will be here. I am open for questions right now. I
- 14 will be sitting here for the rest of this conversation,
- 15 so...
- 16 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Thank you, ma'am.
- 17 Any questions --
- 18 COMMISSIONER PATON: I have.
- **19** CHAIRMAN TITLA: -- for the representative?
- 20 Commissioner Paton.
- 21 COMMISSIONER PATON: Thank you for your
- 22 presentation.
- I guess my concern is when we had like ten
- 24 candidates all writing checks to a party, and this is
- 25 supposed to be independent money from the state, it

- 1 lot of time in that.
- 2 COMMISSIONER PATON: I am sorry.
- 3 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: Yeah.
- 4 COMMISSIONER PATON: But the picture of writing
- 5 checks to a party of -- you are getting a certain amount
- 6 of money. And we saw candidates writing checks of 10-,
- 7 \$12,000 to a party. To me, just, it bothers me as far as
- 8 the independence of this, of the clean elections money.
- 9 I have been a part of campaigns before. And I
- 10 know in the instances that I have been a part of them, the
- 11 campaign chairman gets the accountants and whoever else
- 12 organizes these kinds of things. And it is separate from
- 13 the party, especially when you are in the primary. In the
- 14 primary, you know, the party doesn't really want to, you
- 15 know, back one instead of somebody else.
- Do you understand my concern, I guess?
- 17 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: Yeah, I know.
- 18 Absolutely.
- So my campaign, I, I don't have the exact number
- 20 memorized. I think it was \$3600. So in terms of the
- 21 checks and candidates who wrote to the party, I wrote the
- 22 party, or the ADLCC -- no, the Democratic party, sorry --
- a 3600 check. But, and I can't speak for other
- 24 candidates, I can only speak for myself, but I was getting
- services in return to further my candidacy and my

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- 1 just -- I guess, why can't you just find a campaign
- 2 chairman and the other people that help the campaign
- 3 chairman separate from your party? I don't understand
- 4 that.
- 5 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: So for me, I was my own
- 6 campaign chairman. And --
- 7 COMMISSIONER PATON: That's hard.
- 8 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: I did everything.
- **9** But I think the party already has the structure
- 10 in place. Because when you are, when you are running the
- 11 campaign that I am running, which is a field campaign, you
- 12 need someone. So you need like an organizer, and you need
- 13 organizers below the organizers who are then doing the
- 14 work in the community to bring in volunteers, to organize
- and cut the list for the volunteers and the paid staff to
- walk and knock on those doors, and someone to then go
- 17 through and call those people. And to build that
- 18 independently, that would, that would take a lot of time
- 19 out of my day as a candidate to try and build that from
- 20 scratch independently. And, so there would be an
- 21 inefficiency. And the most important thing in a campaign
- 22 is not money. The most important thing is the time.
- 23 So --
- 24 COMMISSIONER PATON: But --
- 25 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: -- we would be losing a

- 1 campaign.
- 2 And I mean you could look at the data. You
- 3 compare 2012 to 2016, and voter turnout increased in my
- 4 district. And so, you know, there is indicators that what
- 5 was happening was what was supposed to happen, which was
- 6 people, organizers, canvassers going door to door and
- 7 talking about my candidacy and encouraging people to vote.
- 8 And so, for me, it doesn't -- if it is the party
- 9 that does it or if there is another firm that could be
- 10 more competitive and actually has a capacity to do it, I
- 11 just want the work done. And in my instance, it was the
- 12 party that was the most competitive and most viable
- 13 option.
- And the other thing, too, that I would just add
- is I ran as a Democrat. Like, so to separate clean
- 16 election candidates to start creating this arbitrary rule
- 17 that says, well, if you are running clean you can't use
- 18 the Democratic party services or the Republican party
- 19 services, then it further disincentivizes me from running
- 20 clean in the future because I am a Democrat. And when I
- am at the legislature and the House of Representatives, Icaucus with the Democrats.
- And so that is part of our political system.
- 24 And that's why I think it is important to still have that
 - as an option. It is not mandatory. Like I -- you know,

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- 1 but it is in terms of the kind of campaign that I wanted
- 2 to run and the kind of impact I wanted to have in my
- 3 district, realizing that we needed to hire outside help
- 4 and seeing what was available, in my instance, in my
- 5 district, in my -- given the funding I had, working with
- 6 the Democratic party was the best choice. And I feel like
- 7 they did a really good job.
- 8 I think we are in this boat and we are here and
- 9 you guys are trying to address this, is we need more
- transparency so that without a doubt you can say, oh,
- 11 like, okay, so that money went to hire an organizer and
- 12 two fellows and, you know, they said they were going to
- 13 recruit this many volunteers and target these many doors.
- 14 And I think that's fair.
- You know, when we worked with a firm in our
- 16 primary that wasn't the party, we said this is how many
- 17 doors you can hit, or you are supposed to hit. I don't
- 18 have these numbers memorized. I apologize. And then
- 19 midway through, when they weren't reaching their goal, we
- 20 asked them to give us a refund. And they gave us a
- 21 refund, and then hit the rest of the doors that they were
- 22 supposed to hit.
- So the accountability piece can be better. And
- 24 I think that's what you guys are trying to improve. But
- 25 to completely cut us off from the party resources, it just

- 1 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: So I think it
- 2 is not make a -- "political party for services such as
- 3 consulting."
- 4 So maybe I misread it. Maybe, so does that --
- 5 so let me ask for a clarification. If I am working with a
- 6 firm that isn't the party, I can do an advanced
- 7 placement -- or payment.
- 8 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: I guess I will let
- 9 Mr. Collins respond. But I am asking if your concern is
- **10** about R2-20-703.01(C).
- MR. COLLINS: So I can clarify this.
- 12 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: Okay.
- MR. COLLINS: The language is basically the
- 14 same. They are different because they are, at least as I
- 15 read it, they are different because of the way that we
- 16 broke down the rules in A, B, and C.
- The upshot is, and we can clarify this without a
- 18 substantive change, that you can't advance money without a
- 19 receipt. So, in other words, let's assume you are
- 20 subscribing to a newspaper. You pay, you know, \$30 and
- 21 you are going to get the newspaper for a month. You get a
- 22 receipt that says you have subscribed to the newspaper for
- a month. That's an advanced payment, but you have a
- 24 receipt that tells you what it is for.
- 25 And so if you read (C)(1) in 703.01 and (C)(2)

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- doesn't make sense, because I am running as a Democrat.
- 2 Why wouldn't I be able to use those resources if it is
- 3 going to further my candidacy?
- 4 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Mr. Chairman.
- 5 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Mr. Kimble.
- 6 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Representative, let me
- 7 make sure I understand your objection to the one point
- 8 that you raised about advanced payments.
- 9 So is this, and I will also ask Mr. Collins
- 10 about this, is this under the campaign consultants rule
- 11 that you are talking about, where it says a participating
- 12 candidate may not advance a campaign consultant for
- 13 services? Because I am also looking at the option, the
- 14 original Option C, a participating candidate may, and then
- this talks about may not make an advanced payment to apolitical party.
- So your concern is about making advanced
- 18 payments to a campaign consultant?
- 19 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: So I guess in general.
- 20 But I think it would have a -- if we were prohibited from
- 21 doing that, advance payment to the party, I mean the party
- would probably figure it out, because they have just a lot
- 23 more scale. But for consultants, especially local firms,
- 24 they don't have that scale. So I think --
- 25 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: So you are --

- 1 together, not advance and only provide payments upon
- 2 receipt of an itemized, timely invoice, basically you
- 3 can't advance cash. You can get, you can buy ahead of
- 4 time provided you know what you are buying.
- 5 So if it is a thing like we are going to pay,
- 6 our view is, if you are going to pay for, I don't know, I
- 7 am going to buy, you know, a thousand mailers or whatever,
- 8 a thousand handbills, I don't have to have a handbill in
- 9 hand but I do have to have a receipt that says I have paid
- 10 for a thousand handbills. And then if it turns out you
- 11 don't get a thousand handbills, then the resulting
- 12 difference ought to be returned to you. That's the way we
- 13 intend the rule to operate. And that's what we think it
- 14 says.
- 15 If the language is confusing, we don't think it
- would be a substantial change to, I don't think it would
- 17 be a substantial change to tweak that and make it clear if
- 18 folks wanted to for the next meeting. But that's, the
- 19 upshot is that what we don't want to have happen is, to
- 20 your point and to Commissioner Kimble's point, we don't
- 21 want to have -- and we fix a lot of this stuff in the
- 22 process of Sara's and Amy's and other desk reviewers of
- the campaign, but we did have some, you know, some lineitems and campaign finance reports that seemed very vague.
- 25 Those got fixed. And those also got, we got, you know,

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- 1 sworn evidence about all those things in the enforcement
- 2 process. However, this would prevent that. It would say
- 3 you can't write a 12,000 line item for miscellaneous,
- 4 which you didn't do but was done and corrected. And you
- 5 would have to have what it is before you pay the money.
- 6 That's our goal.
- 7 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Whether that is from a
- 8 political committee or a private consultant.
- 9 MR. COLLINS: Right, right. It is like a
- 10 purchase order. Like we issue purchase orders here to our
- 11 marketing firm or to our auditing firm that says, you
- 12 know, this is how much, this is what you are going to do,
- 13 you are going to charge against this purchase order; if
- 14 there is an amount left over that you didn't use, then we
- are not going to obviously pay you that or you are going
- 16 to give it back. We do the same thing with interagency
- 17 service agreements. We do it with the Attorney General's
- 18 Office. It is based on a pro rata basis. We advance
- 19 funds. They return funds when they haven't been used.
- 20 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Okay. So --
- MR. COLLINS: But it is all itemized in terms of
- 22 what the services are.
- 23 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Okay. So do you still
- 24 have problems with that with that clarification, or are
- 25 you okay with it?

- 1 on this today just because our other Commissioner is not
- 2 here. And, again, it is up to the Commission. But what I
- 3 would like to suggest is that we just make sure with
- 4 staff, I know we have gotten at least a couple of other, I
- 5 think, just members of the public who are considering
- 6 running clean who had thoughts on this, and I would of
- 7 course like to make sure that you and the other members
- 8 have your concerns addressed.
- 9 It sounds like with Commissioner Kimble's
- 10 questioning, we discovered that maybe we are on the same
- 11 page, that you maybe, even under this rule, could still
- 12 operate the way that you needed to. And my understanding
- 13 has been that, you know, especially when you are just
- 14 starting out, I think that candidates need the parties'
- 15 support. That's kind of what the parties do. I think
- 16 that what we were trying to do is solve a problem that we
- saw as kind of a slush fund for the parties or theconsultants perhaps with kind of vague invoicing or
- 19 receipts.
- So, but maybe if the other Commissioners are in
- 21 agreement, perhaps we could just ask staff to make sure
- 22 that we are addressing any concerns that you do have that
- 23 are outstanding and come back at our next meeting to
- 24 finalize these proposals, Mr. Chairman.
- 25 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioners? Kimble?

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- 1 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: Yeah, the clarification
- 2 makes sense, and that's, I think, how things operate now.
- 3 MR. COLLINS: Yeah.
- 4 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: So yeah.
- 5 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Okay. So you would not be
- 6 making a payment to either a political party or a
- 7 consultant without a bill or some itemized statement
- 8 saying this is what you are paying for ahead of time.
- 9 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: That's correct. And to
- 10 me, that's really important, too, because otherwise you
- 11 don't have anything to hold them accountable to.
- 12 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Okay.
- 13 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: So, you know, that, and
- 14 if that's how you put that in writing, then that makes
- 15 sense. And, yeah, I think that should be happening,
- 16 absolutely.
- 17 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Okay. Thank you.
- 18 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Chan.
- 19 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Mr. Chairman, Representative
- 20 Salmon, thank you so much for being here. I know that
- 21 your time is so valuable, and I know we have another
- 22 elected member here, and I just really appreciate both of
- your time to kind of provide us this feedback.
- I think, I hope you guys wouldn't mind, I don't
- 25 know how the other Commissioners feel, if we didn't vote

- 1 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Well, I am supportive of
- 2 that, but I am also very interested in hearing from the
- 3 other people who have come here.
- 4 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Absolutely.
- 5 REPRESENTATIVE SALMON: Thank you.
- 6 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Representative, thank you for
- 7 your presentation. I really learned a lot. And this
- 8 feedback that you gave us was very good, because we just
- 9 look at the rules and review the rules, and without
- 10 feedback from yourself, a person like yourself in the
- 11 representative capacity, then we would be, I think, short
- 12 of information, so very good information. It sounds like
- you run an intense grassroots campaign in your district.
- 14 And it sounds like you did a good job. You are here as an
- 15 elected representative. So congratulations.
- But looking at the language, Director Collins,
- 17 it seems that it is kind of conflicting or vague to me,
- and now that the representative has brought this out,
- **19** because if you look at R2-20-703.01(C)(1), it says that a
- 20 participating candidate may not advance a campaign
- 21 consultant for services such as consulting,
- 22 communications, and other advertising purchases and other
- 23 campaign services. So I am confused what not advance
- 24 means, not advance a campaign consultant.
- And then (2) says that a participating candidate

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- may only provide payment for such services as described in
- 2 subsection (C)(1) of this rule upon receipt of an
- 3 itemized --
- 4 MR. COLLINS: Sure.
- 5 CHAIRMAN TITLA: So I would suggest that we
- 6 clarify that not advance a campaign consultant. I don't
- 7 know what that means.
- 8 MR. COLLINS: Yes. Mr. Chairman, Commissioners,
- 9 I am of the view to, subject to correction by Mr. La Rue,
- that that's, that that change, because of what we think 10
- 11 the language says, will not be a substantial change, would
- 12 be a technical change, and that we could do that for the
- next meeting without any problem, without having to 13
- recirculate for 60 days, is my view. 14
- 15 So that's, that, you know, we may hear
- differently down the road, but provisionally I believe 16
- 17 that's a reason -- I mean for purposes of having all of
- 18 these rules in a form we want them, that's a, more of a
- nuance change than a substantial change. And I think we 19
- 20 can do that well within our discretion and within the APA,
- 21 even though the APA doesn't apply to us. So I think
- that's exactly the kind of change we can make for the next 22
- 23 meeting.
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. And I agree with 24
- 25 Commissioner Chan, that we hold off on voting on this

- 1 that.
- 2 But I do want to speak to the idea that there is
- 3 this fine line of like -- I understand that I am taking
- 4 public money and that there is things I cannot do with it
- 5 and that I should not do. But part of what we are doing
- 6 with this is to empower the public to be a part of the
- 7 political process. And the political process is already
- 8 set up with parties. And so, to me, it feels like it is a
- part of political speech, or like freedom of political
- speech to declare what party we are working with. And, 10
- 11 but these objectives of part C would make everything a lot
- 12 clearer.
- And so I believe -- I guess what I don't want to 13
- 14 see, though, is a discouraging of people from using clean
- 15 elections. And so we have already voiced how hard it is
- to -- I mean vendors are not set up to even deal with 16
- 17 clean election candidates normally. They don't write
- 18 their plans to deal with clean election candidates. They
- 19 don't have their billing and checking set up to deal with
- clean election candidates. So it is already an education 20
- 21 process for us as it is. And even with Option C we will
- have to sit down and totally write the rules and have to 22
- 23 make sure that our vendors have the ability to do this.
- And we will take on that, that responsibility. 24
- 25 So I mean I guess I just want to let you know

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- until Commissioner Meyer is here because he is an integral
- part of our Commission and we can, I think, do that, if
- 3 that's okay.
- 4 Let's hear from the other representatives here.
- 5 REPRESENTATIVE MENDEZ: Hello. My name is Juan
- Mendez. I am the state senator from District 26.
- 7 I don't want to reiterate too much of what my
- 8 counterpart in the House said, but I do want to speak to
- 9 some of the questions that were brought up.
- 10 I do welcome the change that people are
- suggesting. That would make all this easier for me. I 11
- guess I don't want to come up here and complain. But it 12
- already is hard being a clean elections candidate in the 13
- political reality that we have. And I understand what it 14
- 15 means to be clean. And I am really appreciative and
- grateful for your stewardship of this program. It is --16
- that's the only reason I would be, I am in office, is 17
- 18 because of this clean election system.
- 19 I think everybody should be, I believe everybody
- 20 should be running as a clean candidate so that we can
- remove the impression of special-interest controlling 21
- 22 candidates. And so I do, I welcome, I mean I appreciate
- 23 your concern about the optics of what this looks like when
- we cut checks and what the public can see. And so I do 25 think the transparency that comes in Option C will address

- that I am happy with how we are going forward if Option C
- is what we think would be able to work with that.
- 3 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any questions for Senator
- 4 Mendez?
- 5 Commissioner Paton.
- COMMISSIONER PATON: I guess besides the optics,
- when I view clean elections, I view it as being
- independent. And I know that the -- that you are a part
- 9 of a party. But when you have to, when you write checks
- 10 to me, to the party, then that gives the party a chance to
- 11 maybe strong-arm you and forcing you to do something that the party wants. Maybe you want to be independent and do 12
- something a little bit different, and, but you are writing 13
- checks to them. Whereas, if you didn't write checks to 14
- 15 the party, you would have a political consultant, campaign
- people, whatever -- I know we are not talking about 16
- \$500,000 or anything like that. But I have been part of 17
- campaigns before. And I know that the party has power to 18
- 19 kind of grind you down to accept what the party in general
- 21 I just feel like this takes away -- it may be
- 22 semantics, but to me it is important that, instead of
- 23 writing a check to a party, you could have a campaign
- person that may be associated with them somehow or
- 25 whatever, but engage them privately and write the check to

- wouldn't know about it. So I feel that's what you 8
- 9 shouldn't do.

23

10 COMMISSIONER PATON: No, you would write a check 11 to your campaign person. They would have to write a

receipt to you, so on. It is just not you are not doing 12

13 it to the party.

REPRESENTATIVE MENDEZ: So like an intermediary 14

15 maybe. But what we end up fighting with with the party is

- much more over the scale and size and what the mailer is 16
- going to look like. There is never -- the organization or 17
- 18 the entity that you described is much more on the
- 19 political PAC side, it has nothing to do with the party,
- 20 that we never engage with in any kind of monetary way.
- 21 That doesn't get our money.
- 22 So our money goes directly to the organizational
- 23 effort, the part that we couldn't build on ourselves, in a
- 24 very practical way that just the -- I use my party as a
- 25 way to access the VAN, the voter, the voter file. Without

- 22 And me being here, it just seems like this money
- 23 should be independent. You are getting money from the
- state. You don't want special interest money. But then 24
- you want to just give it to a party who could tell you how
- - to -- and maybe I am totally off about that. But just, to
 - me, I have had some experiences with that, where that's --
 - and I don't want to beat a dead horse here for anybody. 3
 - 4 Go ahead. I am sorry.
 - 5 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Thank you, Commissioner Paton.
 - 6 Any other statement?
 - 7 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Mr. Chairman.
 - 8 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Chan.
 - 9 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Just thank you also for
 - being here today. And I am sorry that we were not able to 10 hear from Representative Blanc.
 - 11 12 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Senator, thank you for coming

 - 13 to us.
 - And I think that, Commissioners, he is a 14
 - 15 senator, the honorable senator, and also he is a citizen
 - of the State of Arizona. And he brings out a good point 16
 - 17 in the statement that he made about making -- I think what

 - 18 I got from him is that the rules that we create here
 - 19 should be clear enough for the average citizen to
 - 20 understand so that the citizens do not have to hire
 - attorneys to interpret the rules for them. The rules 21
 - 22 should be clear enough so that they understand what we are
 - 23 trying to, you know, write here. So let's keep that in
 - 24
 - 25 And I think that it is good to review the

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- 1 Citizens Clean Elections Act and the reason it was passed
- 2 by the public. The people of Arizona said that they
- 3 declare our intent to create a clean election system that
- 4 will improve the integrity of Arizona state government by
- 5 diminishing the influence of special interest money and
- 6 that will encourage citizen participation in the political
- 7 process and promote freedom of speech under the US and
- 8 Arizona Constitutions.
- 9 So I think that the more we can have access to
- the public and their participation in their system, under
- 11 the clean elections as mandated by the public, I think
- 12 that the better we will be.
- But thank you, Senator, for your statement.
- And any other representatives here?
- MR. COLLINS: I know we have, Mr. Chairman, I
- 16 know we have two other folks who were interested in
- 17 testifying, or one other. I don't know, Joel and Dana.
- 18 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Can you identify yourself for
- 19 the record, sir.
- MR. EDMAN: Yeah. My name is Joel Edman. I am
- 21 the executive director of the Arizona Advocacy Network.
- Those of you I haven't met yet you probably
- 23 remember my predecessor, Samantha Pstross. And we at
- 24 Advocacy Network are huge fans of clean elections. It is,
- 25 a core part of our mission is to protect clean elections.

- 1 will just echo the concern about sort of tweaking the
- 2 rule. I did read it to mean that you couldn't do any
- 3 advanced payments whatsoever. I think if it is the rule
- 4 as Tom laid it out, I think, makes a lot of sense.
- 5 So that's all I have. I just wanted to sort of
- 6 say that AzAN is a huge clean elections fan and basically
- 7 agrees with what has been said so far this morning.
- 8 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Thank you for your
- 9 statement.
- 10 Any questions for --
- 11 MR. EDMAN: Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Any other comment by
- **13** anyone here?

15

- MR. COLLINS: Your call.
 - MS. WALTON: My name is Dana Walton. I am the
- 16 executive director of the Arizona Democratic Legislative
- 17 Campaign Committee. We say ADLCC because it rolls off the
- 18 tongue a little bit better.
- So we are the arm of the Democratic party that
- 20 services solely on legislative races. But I, on a daily
- 21 basis, encourage candidates to run, and oftentimes it is
- 22 to run clean, because as we talk about here and as has
- 23 been mentioned, a huge part of a first entry to politics,
- 24 which the legislature often is, running clean and having
- 25 access to this money and being able to spend more time on

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- 1 So we do a lot of work at the Capitol with Tom on the
- 2 repealer bill this session, and we continue to going
- 3 forward.
- 4 And I don't have a lot substantive to add to
- 5 what the elected officials who have run clean before. I
- 6 have never run for office before. So their personal
- 7 experience, I think, is a lot more valuable than anything
- 8 I would have to say. Although, I echo their concerns,
- **9** because it is something I have heard from candidates, that
- 10 a strict bar on paying parties for anything or limiting it
- 11 to just those two items in Option B would seriously
- 12 discourage candidates from running clean.
- And, you know, I think the transparency provided
- in Option C and, further, transparency generally is a
- 15 really valuable part of the clean elections system. And
- 16 you all can impose rules that provide that kind of
- 17 transparency on an ongoing basis. And so I think that the
- 18 right balance to strike between providing that
- 19 transparency and not discouraging participation in the
- 20 system is something that I really worry about going
- 21 forward. You know, we already have a, unfortunately, less
- 22 robust system than, of course, we did before the Supreme
- 23 Court. And I worry about any, you know, further
- 24 discouragement from candidates running clean.
- And along the issue of the advanced payments, I

- 1 talking to voters is crucial to their first campaign.
- 2 So we, as an organization, are in support of
- 3 Option C. Greater transparency is certainly something
- 4 that we want not just from political parties but also from
- 5 consultants who work with these clean candidates.
- 6 Option A and Option B certainly would make it
- 7 significantly harder for our candidates to run and to
- 8 address some of the concerns I think that you had, which I
- 9 am sure you will ask. It is simply that there is no use
- 10 in reinventing the wheel, particularly for some of these
- 11 candidates who are running for the first time and may not
- 12 have necessarily the networks to really grow and engage
- 13 new folks in sort of this operation.
- And campaigns are ever changing. So we need
- some professionals to help these candidates, particularly
- 16 running for the first time, to learn the ropes, and not
- 17 just the bare bones techniques in running for office, but
- 18 these newer. Right? There is digital ads, there is
- 20 professionals to assist these candidates in sort of
- 21 learning how to utilize. So Option A and B, I think, and

Facebook, there are all these things that require trained

- 22 utilizing -- eliminating utilizing the political party for
- 23 those purposes would really hinder a lot of our
- 24 candidates' ability to run.
- We have a 30-district strategy at ADLCC. And,

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- like I said, a huge part of that is asking those folks to
- run clean so that they can really put the time and effort
- that they need to in their campaigns. 3
- 4 So with that, if you have any other further
- 5 questions...
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any questions? 6
- 7 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Mr. Chairman.
- 8 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Mr. Kimble.
- 9 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Ms. Walton, you have no
- problem with, in Option C, providing an itemized written 10
- 11 bill, receipt, whatever, in advance of service provided?
- 12 MS. WALTON: Absolutely not. I believe that
- last cycle, which is, I believe, where a lot of this is 13
- 14 coming from, that should have been provided to legislative
- 15 candidates up front, and not just legislative candidates.
- Right? There are other candidates who received complaints 16
- regarding their buy-in into the coordinated campaign 17
- 18 operation.
- 19 So I was not a part of this discussion,
- 20 unfortunately. Had I been, they would have been received.
- 21 I function much better in a structured environment, and I
- believe that's what the invoice allows for. 22
- 23 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Okay. Thank you.
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any more questions? 24
- 25 COMMISSIONER CHAN: Mr. Chairman.

- Senator Mendez mentioned, when we are arguing with the
- candidate or trying to make sure that they are
- 3 implementing something in their campaign only, it is that
- 4 we want you all to knock more doors. Oftentimes those are
- 5 sort of the larger discussions that we are having with
- 6 candidates, that I think was mentioned before, is a
- 7 concern of, you know, the party coming in and
- 8
- strong-arming candidates. That certainly is not our
- 9 intention. Our intention is to make sure that these candidates are receiving services in their district for 10
- 11 the financial investment that they have made into the 12 party.
- COMMISSIONER PATON: I have a question. 13
- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner. 14
 - COMMISSIONER PATON: But you concede to me
- 16 that --

15

- 17 MS. WALTON: Absolutely.
- 18 COMMISSIONER PATON: -- it is possible. I mean
- 19 you look back through politics over the years --
- 20 MS. WALTON: Yes.
- 21 COMMISSIONER PATON: -- Tammany Hall and, you
- 22 know, just over the years --
- 23 MS. WALTON: Right.
- COMMISSIONER PATON: -- that that's a 24
- 25 possibility.

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- CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Chan. 1
- COMMISSIONER CHAN: I would just like to add 2
- that, you know, I feel like the Democratic party has been 3
- overrepresented here today -- I am sure this could happen 4
- in any party -- I think, you know, just because of what 5
- happened last cycle, I think, involved of course the
- 7 Democratic party, so... But I think that this rule will
- prevent it from happening in the future for certain, any 8
- 9 party.
- 10 MS. WALTON: I believe so, too.
- And Tom and I have talked a lot about Option C 11
- 12 actually. I think there is a lot of really good things in
- it that will prevent some of this confusion and/or 13
- frustration on behalf of the Commission, that you see 14
- 15 these clean election candidates running and they are
- buying into the party operation at, you know, \$12,000, 16
- 17 which was mentioned before.
- 18 I can assure you that those candidates did
- 19 receive equal amount of services for their buy-in. So
- 20 Elizabeth Brown, who ran in LD12, who did buy in at
- \$12,000, she was the only legislative candidate running in 21
- 22 the ballot there. And that meant that she was receiving
- 23 data back from all those voter contact goals that were
- given to the staff in the district. 24
- 25 So the number one thing that we often, I think

- MS. WALTON: Yes. 1
- 2 COMMISSIONER PATON: And so that's my concern.
- 3 MS. WALTON: Yeah. It is certainly not that I
- do not respect, Commissioner, where you are coming from 4
- and those concerns. I guess I want to be here to tell 5
- 6 you, as a whole Commission, that that certainly is not our
- 7 intention.
- 8 You know, we are here to make sure that these
- 9 candidates have the best chance to run a comprehensive and
- 10 modern campaign. That is what I do day in and day out as
- a trained professional. I've been working in campaigns 11
- specifically for about ten years now. 12
- 13 So, you know, we, we just really want to make
- sure that our candidates are using their time and 14
- 15 resources as wisely as possible. So sometimes reinventing
- the wheel really eliminates a candidate from utilizing 16 their time, which we always tell candidates during our 17
- 18 candidate trainings your two most fleeting resources are
- 19 your time and your money. And with clean elections
- 20 candidates, we know how much money they are going to get.
- We know when they are going to get it. So that means 21
- their time and implementing their campaign is the most 22
- 23 important resource there. So our intention is to make
- sure that they are using that wisely. 24
- 25 COMMISSIONER PATON: So of the people you

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- 1 have -- excuse me. Of the people that you have running in
- 2 the 30 districts, how many of them are a part of your
- 3 system that -- are all of the Democrats in your system?
- 4 MS. WALTON: Our program? So we invite everyone
- 5 to be a part of our program. We offer baseline services
- 6 to everyone. And that is because some of them, right, are
- 7 current caucus members who are running in districts that
- 8 look completely different from some of those new
- 9 candidates who are running in other parts of the state
- 10 that look vastly different. And so, yes, we try to invite
- 11 everyone to be a part of our program.
- 12 COMMISSIONER PATON: Do they all accept, I
- **13** guess?
- MS. WALTON: Yeah, for the most part, certainly.
- And when you are offering services, I think some
- of our, specifically, legislators like Athena and Juan are
- a perfect example, they have done this for a cycle, but
- 18 beyond that, they were politically involved beforehand and
- 19 so they knew more or less what they were getting into.
- 20 Some of our candidates who are first-time
- 21 candidates, this is really their first entry into
- 22 politics. And so they haven't really had time to build
- 23 the network that you would need to find an independent
- 24 campaign chairman who is not then either employed by the
- 25 party or work directly with them.

- 1 MS. WALTON: Overwhelmed with the amount of work
- 2 they get? Certainly, you know, a huge part of why --
- 3 again, when Tom and I first spoke about these rules, that
- 4 we were pro Option C is because it -- working with a
- 5 candidate or campaign, you should be willing to undertake
- 6 some of what goes on or some of the regulations that
- 7 candidates have to provide or live under.
 - I personally think it would be fine if you
- 9 received a mail piece. I work with vendors all the time
- and set expectations of what they have to do. There are
- 11 certainly, when candidates run traditionally, other
- 12 requirements and laws that the mail houses have to work
- under, even on the independent expenditure side. Right?
- 14 The candidate has to -- i.e., a piece has to go to
- 15 everyone in the district that's being impacted.
- So in my personal opinion, and it may not be
- 17 popular to say so, I am not of the opinion that that is a
- 18 huge burden.
- 19 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Ma'am, in your experience in
- 21 campaigns where a first-time person starts a campaign and
- 22 they want to employ people for the campaign, like
- 23 consultants or people in communications or field
- 24 employees, canvassers, mailers, auto dialers, telephone,
- town halls, or electronic communications, or other

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- 1 And a huge part of it, too, is making sure that
- 2 those connections can help grow their networks outside of
- 3 the party. And that is something we certainly encourage
- 4 them to do, and really working with them on, you know,
- 5 learning sort of the basic lessons in campaign techniques,
- 6 so..
- 7 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any further questions?
- 8 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: Mr. Chairman.
- 9 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Commissioner Kimble.
- 10 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: One other question,
- 11 Ms. Walton. This may not be fair, but one of the comments
- 12 we received, and I am asking you this just as someone who
- was in this field --
- MS. WALTON: Sure.
- 15 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: -- which I am not, deals
- 16 with a number, a different concern, saying that one of our
- 17 stipulations in Option C would be that the Commission
- 18 should be provided documentation from a mail house printer
- or other source, et cetera, et cetera. And this comment says this sets an undue burden on the printing house; it
- 21 has been my experience print shops do not respond in a
- 22 timely manner.
- Is this a, is this -- I don't know how to say
- 24 this. Is this a legitimate concern? Is this a major
- 25 issue, that print shops are a big problem?

- advertising purchases and campaign purchases, would these
- 2 companies or these people agree to produce an invoice
- 3 without getting paid?
- 4 MS. WALTON: So I believe it would depend on the
- 5 type of services, service that you are attempting to
- 6 offer. Right? So to Athena's point, or Representative
- 7 Salmon, I apologize, if you are employing a firm that
- 8 specifically goes out and does door knocking, right, so
- 9 they are providing -- and the service really that they are
- 10 providing is the voter contact on behalf your campaign
- and, ideally, returning to you data and information on
- 12 specifically those voters that they talked to,
- 13 specifically if you are talking to a firm and they are a
- 14 smaller firm, a local firm -- we have a few of them here
- 15 in Arizona and they do great work -- it would be hard to
- 16 undertake an overhead expense to employ the necessary
- 17 people through their own organization to go out and knock
- 18 those doors without any sort of initial service.
- 19 If you are working with -- so this is one of the
- 20 points, too, that I had thought about -- if you are
- working with a larger firm who can sort of cover thatoverhead initially, and then you not have to pay them
- 23 until the service is rendered, then the candidate's
- 24 expenses, right, it is going to be a more expensive
- 25 service, because you are using a larger firm that

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- typically will charge candidates a little bit more than,
- 2 say, a local firm. And that is a huge concern of ours
- 3 when we are talking legislative candidates. Right? We
- 4 want to make sure they are getting the most bang for the
- 5 buck, particularly because they are running under this
- 6 service of \$42,000, right, is what it is up to.
- 7 So we want to, again, it goes back to making
- 8 sure that they are utilizing -- sorry, I am repeating
- 9 myself -- they are working with firms that can sort of
- take on that cost. So if you are rendering payments after
- 11 the service is done, it would certainly be, I think,
- 12 harder for these smaller firms to provide those services
- 13 to the candidates. And they would actually have to
- 14 probably pay more or go to a larger firm who could take on
- 15 that overhead.
- The Democratic party, as Athena mentioned, does
- 17 have the capacity, because there are other organizations
- 18 and entities sort of buying into the coordinated campaign
- 19 and receiving these services as well. So they have the
- 20 opportunity to take on some of that overhead.
- But, additionally, the Democratic party is a
- 22 nonprofit. We are not trying to make money off of what we
- 23 are providing, whereas a consulting firm certainly is,
- 24 so...
- The other services, though, some of them may be

- 1 MR. COLLINS: -- rule to make it clear, and then
- 2 we will bring it back. There will be another -- that
- 3 extends an opportunity for folks who want to submit
- 4 written comment for the next month, and then, of course,
- 5 folks who have opinions that might be more consistent
- 6 with -- you know, obviously we have a diversity of views
- 7 up here, so there are other folks that might come to the
- 8 next meeting who might share different views. So that's
- 9 all going good.
- 10 Representative Blanc has come back.
- 11 If you would like to speak, I am not -- I mean
- 12 it is up to the Chairman.
 - COMMISSIONER PATON: Representative, the
- 14 Honorable.
- 15 REPRESENTATIVE BLANC: Thank you so much,
- 16 Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. I really appreciate your
- **17** time.

13

- I just wanted to come and tell you a little bit
- 19 about myself as a first-time clean elections candidate and
- 20 now representative, just kind of give you a different
- 21 perspective.
- 22 Sorry. I am out of breath.
- 23 COMMISSIONER PATON: Calm down.
- **24** REPRESENTATIVE BLANC: I ran over here.
- You know, I remember 1998 when the clean

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- 1 able, particularly if you are paying an individual to
- 2 implement as a digital campaign strategy, and they -- you
- 3 know, you know them more personally or they are a friend,
- 4 you could probably, they could probably wait to be paid
- 5 after that service was rendered. But specifically for
- 6 consulting firms who then have to employ additional people
 7 to go out and provide the service, my assumption is that
- 7 to go out and provide the service, my assumption is that8 rendering the payment once the service is over is going to
- **9** be really hard for those consulting firms to implement.
- 10 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Thank you for your
- 11 comments.
- MS. WALTON: Absolutely. No other?
- 13 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Any other questions?
- 14 (No response.)
- MS. WALTON: Thank you so much. And thank you
- **16** for your consideration.
- 17 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Okay. Thank you.
- **18** Let's see. Where were we at?
- MR. COLLINS: So, Mr. Chairman, my
- 20 understanding --
- 21 CHAIRMAN TITLA: We are deciding not to decide
- 22 today?
- MR. COLLINS: Right. And we were going to, we
- 24 are going to tweak the --
- 25 CHAIRMAN TITLA: Rules?

- 1 elections was on the ballot. And I remember voting yes.
- 2 And I remember voting yes because for me, as an Arizona
- 3 citizen, I was really concerned with what I was seeing in
- 4 our politics. And since that time, close to 20 years, it
- 5 saddens me to say that money and politics has only gotten
- 6 worse, and especially the last ten years.
- 7 So for me, when you look at my resumé, it says
- 8 nothing about having or creating a political career. I
- 9 was a mom, still am. I have a 21 and an 18-year-old. I
- 10 guess you can say my politics started when I became a PTA
- 11 president. And I became a PTA president because I really
- wanted to be invested in my community, not only my
- 13 children's education, but the children who were attending
- 14 the school.
- Aside from helping in one campaign, former
- 16 Congressman Harry Mitchell, I was really not involved in
- 17 politics. And I helped Congressman Harry Mitchell because
- 18 he was a former high school teacher of mine and I knew
- 19 that he would certainly represent me well.
- The reason I share this is because, for me, it
- 21 is an important part of my story. I would have never in
- 22 my lifetime thought or considered running for any
- position, not even a school board position. And so when Ilook at the intent of the clean elections, it is to give
- 25 people like me an opportunity to run, someone like me, who

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- is not wealthy by any means.
- 2 I remember when my children were young, I worked
- part time, because my first role was to be a mom and to 3
- 4 forego financial benefit, and standing in front of
- 5 curtains and deciding if I could afford to pay the \$15 for
- these new curtains that I thought I needed. The answer at 6
- 7 that time was no.
- 8 I also am not at all politically connected.
- 9 Many who talk to me, I say, tell them I am very green.
- They will name people in politics that I know nothing of. 10
- 11 It could be anyone, other than the people that I know who
- 12 represent me in my city council and in my legislative
- district and congressional district. 13
- 14 Why is it important? Because I took a chance
- 15 with two phenomenal people right behind me, Representative
- 16 Salmon, who I am sure gave an amazing report, because she,
- 17 I call her the clean elections guru, she is passionate and
- 18 understands this much more, better than I, and same with
- Senator Mendez. And they took a risk with me. They asked 19
- 20 me to join and be a part of their team, someone with no
- 21 political savvy, someone that is not at all connected to
- wealth or money, certainly not at all connected to any 22
- 23 lobbyists or people who want to drive their interests in
- politics. 24

9

23

25 And so the first step of even deciding to run

- sun went down all the way through the end of May.
- 2 And I can further tell you that between June and
- 3 primary election day, I knocked on doors every single day
- 4 with my seat mates starting at 9:00 a.m. until 1 p.m.,
- 5 sometimes going to our favorite taco place, and then
- 6 starting back again at 4:00 and walking until the sun went
- 7 down.
- 8 And the reason I am describing these events to
- 9 you is because that's what clean elections allowed me to
- do. It allowed me to spend time talking to my 10
- 11 constituents. It allowed me not to worry about where the
- 12 money was going to come from, because I had to work to get
- 300 qualifying contributions and over 1200 signatures. So 13
- for someone like me, who is not at all politically 14
- 15 connected, I was able to do it because I had two amazing
- people. And Juan Mendez, who this was his third election,
- so he understood how to use clean elections a lot better 17
- 18 than I.
- 19 And I have got to tell you we would sit at the
- 20 dinner table and have discussions about our financial
- 21 reports. And you know because the three of us were
- 22 audited. And we used our money the best way we knew how.
- 23 But I have to tell you that, as a clean
- elections candidate, if you are not politically savvy, as 24
- I was, it is intimidating, and even reading through the

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- for office for a person like me is incredibly
- intimidating. The first and most difficult decision for
- me was even deciding to run. And when I decided to run, 3
- it is because I was guided by these two people that I 4
- absolutely adore and I see as my mentors, and because I 5
- 6 believe in the clean elections system. And I believe in
- 7 the clean elections system because I want to stay true to
- my values. I want to represent the people from my 8
- district, from the community I grew up in. And clean 10 elections has allowed me to do that as a representative.
- 11 And I have to tell you I spent 95 percent of my
- 12 time knocking on doors because clean elections allowed me
- to do that. I can tell you of the many faces and the many 13 people that live in my district. And I can tell you what 14
- 15 their number one concern is, because I had those
- conversations at the door. 16
- 17 I can tell you that between January and
- 18 March 31st of 2016, when I was working full time, first
- 19 things first, I had to leave that job because it's a state
- 20 agency. And I can tell you between my 8:00 to 5:00 job I
- came home and I started knocking on doors to collect those 21
- 22 \$5 qualifying contributions until 7:30 and 8:00, along
- with my seat mates. I can tell you when I left my job starting on April 1st, it became an earlier walk, starting 24
- 25 at 4:00 as opposed to 5:00, 5:30, and walking until the

- rules. So the fact that we are considering to change and
- make it harder for candidates and now representatives like
- 3 me, I looked at those rules and I am credibly intimidated,
- because I was already intimidated by the process that we 4
- 5 currently have, because I wanted to make sure I was
- 6 following every single rule, which I did. I saved every
- 7 receipt. We looked over every piece of mail carefully.
- 8 We would call Sara for support and advice and
- 9 clarification on anything that I did not understand. And
- 10 as we know, the process to run for office is already made
- 11 incredibly difficult for a mom of two that never imagined
- 12 running for public office.
- 13 So I looked back. You know, the clean elections
- is to allow more citizens like me to run for office. It 14
- 15 reduces the influence of interest money, making the
- 16 officeholders beholden to the voters, and I have been, and
- I continue to be; allows officeholders to spend time 17
- 18 speaking to the public and not having to worry about
- 19 raising funds. It has.
- 20 Rose Mofford said, God rest her soul, that she
- saw firsthand the negative influence of money and 21
- politics. And that was close to 20 years ago. She 22
- recalled a time when policymakers, politicians spent more time connecting with their constituents and their voters. 24
- She talked about the importance of taking money out of 25

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- 1 politics. And she understood that it threatened the very
- 2 principle of democracy.
- 3 You know you have done a phenomenal job already.
- 4 And I ask you to seriously consider some of these rules.
- 5 And I am sure you have heard from many why. They could be
- 6 barriers for people like me. And I, a citizen who voted
- 7 for the clean elections in 1998, voted because I trusted
- 8 the system to allow people like me to run for office and
- **9** actually be a voice.
- So I just wanted to share that with you, because
- 11 I think it is important to help you understand the
- 12 positive impact that it has had on my life and how proud I
- am to be a clean elections candidate and how I am
- 14 committed to stay a clean elections candidate, because I
- believe in this process, but, more importantly, because it
- 16 makes me a better policymaker. And this is what Arizona
- 17 citizens wanted close to 20 years ago. And I don't have
- 18 to tell you. There are people that continue to try to
- 19 destroy a system that is working for people like me. So I
- 20 ask that you not, or that you at least consider the rules,
- 21 because we do need some help sometimes.
- I use the voter files that are provided from the
- 23 Democratic party. It is an essential tool for me to be
- 24 effective. This isn't about handing over money to
- 25 political organizations. This is just an opportunity to

- we are just making these rules even harder. I looked
- 2 through it, and I have a hard, had a hard time really
- 3 understanding the process. Right? So I am already trying
- 4 to -- I feel like I kind of have a foothold of the current
- 5 process.
- 6 And I mean maybe you can help me understand what
- 7 we are trying to solve, the problem we are trying to
- 8 solve. Can someone help me understand that?
- 9 COMMISSIONER KIMBLE: I will let Mr. Collins10 address that.
- MR. COLLINS: Well, yeah. The problem,
- 12 Representative Blanc, Mr. Chairman, Representative Blanc,
- 13 the issue we are trying to solve is this. In the 2014
- 14 election we had a number of expenditures that were made to
- 15 the Democratic party in one form or another. Not all the
- 16 folks who made those expenditures did a good job of
- 17 documenting those payments on their campaign finance
- 18 reporting forms. Those forms, because they failed to be
- 19 sufficiently detailed, gave rise to a complaint that said
- 20 basically, hey, you can't just write a miscellaneous check
- 21 for \$12,000 to a party. And that is correct. That is
- 22 true. That is a violation of the law if that is in fact
- 23 true.
- So what we undertook as staff is a comprehensive
- 25 effort to try to audit those candidates who were already

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- 1 help us be a little bit more effective and knowing who we
- 2 are speaking to.
- 3 I appreciate your time. Thank you.

- 11 Commission voted for unanimously in December of 2016
- 12 for this eventuality. That notice has been on our
- 13 website since that time or since before that time and
- 14 then it was reaffirmed at that time, and so it seemed
- 15 like an appropriate time to publish that.
- As of Friday, the Secretary of State had
- 17 told the press that they plan to run both notices in
- 18 the Administrative Register. Should that happen, we
- 19 will know by no later than June 30th whether those have
- 20 run. The -- so that's the headline.
- 21 The -- moving down the list here, the
- 22 meeting itself -- a couple of different things I wanted
- 23 to specifically note. First, the GRRC voted to return
- 24 the report that the Commission submitted on May 19th.
- 25 You know, we were hopeful that that report which had,

- 1 record were not substantive. In other words, not one
- 2 of them addressed R2-20-109, 110 and 111, which are the
- 3 three rules that were subject to the report that was
- 4 submitted on May 19th.
- 5 Additionally, the council let stand its
- 6 purported expiration. As you know, the council took an
- 7 action whereby it was of the belief it had expired or
- 8 set for expiration certain rules and it let that
- 9 decision stand. Why does that matter -- and that then
- 10 led to the notice I mentioned earlier. Why does that
- 11 matter?
- Well, for two particular reasons that we
- 13 ultimately -- some of which we'll need to explore in
- 14 executive session, but just to lay the factual
- 15 predicate here, GRRC in executive session -- they went
- 16 into executive session and they went into the executive
- 17 session with the Attorney General's Office on the Clean
- 18 Elections Commission item which was Item F of their
- 19 agenda. The Attorney General's Office had previously
- 20 declared a conflict on that agenda item which was, in
- 21 fact, noted at the outset of the GRRC meeting.
- Additionally, the purported notice of
- 23 expiration extends whatever action GRRC believes it
- 24 took on two -- in 2 of 2016 to current R2-20-109 and
- 25 R2-20-111, and we don't know when they took action to

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- 1 we thought, some more conciliatory language in it would
- 2 pass muster. It did not with council. What I want to
- 3 specifically call out is that the reasoning for the
- 4 report -- the council doesn't believe it's obligated to
- 5 do this, but in any event, particular councilors
- 6 identified issues.
- 7 The council, as I said, does not believe
- 8 that the council itself has to identify issues, but
- 9 there are two issues that specific councilors
- 10 identified were, one, they disagreed with the
- 11 Commission's factual recitation of the GRRC's actions
- 12 in February of 2016. There were up to two councilors
- 13 who expressed some agreement with that and then a third
- 14 counselor believed that information that was included
- 15 in the cover letter ought to have been better included
- 16 in the report.
- 17 That particular objection, so to speak,
- 18 whatever you want to call it, was a little ironic
- 19 because we've been previously asked to take out -- or
- 20 we had the impression we were asked to take out
- 21 information from the report and put it in the cover
- 22 letter. So that it's been reversed.
- The more important point, however, is that
- 24 none -- none of those two reasons which the only
- 25 reasons that I am aware of or that were given on the

- 1 evaluate those rules in their new light. As I noted,
- 2 the return of report didn't even mention those rules

- 16 have questions related to those facts, I am open to

Maricopa County is considering a switch to all-mail voting. Republic political reporter Rebekah L. Sanders speaks with Elections Director Reynaldo "Rey" Valenzuela about what voters can expect. Rebekah L. Sanders/azcentral.com

More than 1 million Maricopa County voters eligible to participate this fall in city council, school board and other local elections are about to experience big changes in how they cast their ballots.

The most noticeable changes:

- Every voter will receive a mail-in ballot, not just people on the early voting list.
- Traditional polling places will go away. Voters who have lost or spoiled their mail-in ballots, or who prefer to vote in person, will be able to visit any one of dozens of "ballot centers," giving them more location options than before.
- Voters checking in at a ballot center will use a computer kiosk to scan their ID or enter
 personally identifiable information to receive a ballot, instead of handing the ID to a poll
 worker. Then a ballot will be printed for them.
- There will be fewer ballot centers than the current number of polling places, but the ballot centers will have more check-in lines, equipment and staffing, and more locations will be open more days before the election for early voting than previously.

Yavapai, Yuma, Cochise, Graham and Santa Cruz counties use a generally similar process.

The new system makes it easier for voters to participate, lessens wait times and cuts costs, according to Maricopa County Recorder Adrian Fontes. He is holding demonstrations of the system across the Valley and speaking to community groups to get the word out.

"This really is the next step in modernizing our election system, and I think that's something everybody across the board wants to see," Fontes said. "We're enhancing the voter experience. We're opening up more access to the ballot box. We're making it easier for U.S. citizens to vote. We're not sacrificing anything when it comes to security or identity."

'This is how America does it'

But some voters have voiced confusion and concern, questioning the security and necessity of the changes.

GOP activists recently grilled Fontes, a Democrat, in a testy meeting of Legislative District 23.

One man said he did not want to vote by mail.

"I take my grandkids (to the polling place). This is how America does it. (Mail voting is) like mailing a bill or mailing a flier. I don't want that. I want to go to a polling place and hit a button. This is my privilege," he told Fontes, according to a video of the May 11 meeting. "I hope you consider the future of the people of this country and never take a polling place away from them."

Fontes reassured the voter that he could still cast a ballot in person. But the incident underlined the communication challenge election staffers have encountered explaining their goal of sending ballots to all voters and switching traditional polling places to ballot centers.

"You want to go to a ballot center and walk in with your grandkids and get that sticker? You can. We are not taking away in-person voting under the vote-by-mail system," Fontes told the man. "All we're doing is expanding the availability of elections."

Confusion continues

Other Republicans said they left the Scottsdale meeting skeptical.

"I felt like for everything he said, at the end of the sentence it left you with more questions than answers," said Lisa James, a GOP political consultant who attended.

An email blast to Valley conservatives, based on messaging from the Recorder's Office, added to the confusion.

"New County Recorder Adrian Fontes plans to do away with ID at the polls," Republican Legislative District 4 precinct committeeman Richard Hopkins warned in a widely read newsletter last month. "Promotional material he has sent out indicates the goal is to do away with ID at the polls. Suggest that your county supervisor be contacted and urged not to fund this."

At least one activist followed through in an email to the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors.

Hopkins, a Buckeye school-board member, was partially right.

He received a Recorder's Office handout from a ballot center demo that said: "Vote-by-Mail removes 'ID at the polls' requirement (Signature is your proof of identity)."

But that statement is not exactly right. Voters still must provide identification at the ballot center. The difference: A computer will do the checking, not a poll worker.

Like a grocery self-checkout, voters wave their driver's license or voter-registration card under a laser and the computer brings up their identity and prints a ballot. If voters forget one of those two forms of identification, they can enter their name, birth date, address and Social Security or voter-registration number to check in. Failing that, voters can submit the usual provisional ballot, which undergoes additional scrutiny.

Hopkins and others still worry that an impostor could vote with a stolen ID if a poll worker does not compare the photo ID to the face of the person requesting the ballot. Yuma and Cochise counties, which use similar ballot centers, require a poll worker to take ID, officials told *The Arizona Republic*.

"Let's take this to an absurd level. I believe you agree that Vladimir Putin should not vote in the United States. Agreed? How do I know that if I don't take his ID?" an attendee at the LD23 meeting asked Fontes, drawing loud applause.

Fontes did not clearly answer at the meeting. But he later explained that an impostor would have to steal an ID, go to the ballot center before the voter has cast a ballot (otherwise the impostor's ballot would not count) and forge a signature.

Is the new system more secure?

In the new system, all ballot envelopes — whether mailed or submitted at a ballot center — will go through signature verification. Currently, only mail-in ballots, which in some elections make up as much as 97 percent of the votes cast, require signature verification but do not require photo ID.

"We've never gone to someone's living room under the vote-by-mail system and asked them to show us an ID in their living room," Fontes said. "So the security systems that already exist under the current (early-vote system) will exist under our ballot-by-mail system."

"We actually think it's more secure" because trained election workers review signatures, instead of a volunteer poll worker who checks an ID, Chief Deputy Recorder Keely Varvel said.

The Recorder's Office is also considering requiring voters at the ballot centers to key in their Social Security number along with scanning their ID.

However, there could be another security concern in the new plan: When a voter checks in and the computer prints the ballot, a poll worker hands the ballot to the voter.

When ballot centers aren't busy, it may be easy for poll workers to know which ballot should be given to which voter. But when there are crowds, that could become difficult.

Yuma and Cochise counties require poll workers, before handing a newly printed ballot over, to check receipts that voters receive upon check-in.

Fontes: System is efficient, innovative

Election officials are talking about the new plan with community members now, so there is plenty of time to iron out problems before November, Fontes said. And with ballot centers open longer before Election Day than early polling places were in previous elections, there will be more opportunities to troubleshoot, he added.

If all goes well, Fontes hopes to replicate the new system in all elections in Maricopa County, not just local ones, in 2018.

But he'll have to convince the Arizona Legislature and the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors to sign off on the plan. State Sen. Bob Worsley, R-Mesa, <u>introduced a bill this</u> year, but it did not advance.

Fontes touts arguments about government efficiency and innovation that conservatives in those political bodies may warm to.

He cites millions of dollars in potential savings because he can use new, less-expensive technology, can open fewer ballot-center locations and won't have to print more in-person ballots than necessary.

The new all-mail system is another step in the major overhaul of the election office Fontes promised when he campaigned last year against longtime Recorder Helen Purcell, whose failed experiment with a new voting system during the presidential-preference election led to long wait times and angry voters.

Ironically, the ballot centers that Fontes plans to use this year are similar to what Purcell tried in the March 2016 election. But he insists with a big boost in equipment, staffing and locations, and better education for voters ahead of time, the new system will work smoothly.

"I actually think we're gonna have a hell of a lot of people standing around waiting for voters to show up," Fontes said.

And since voters can go to any ballot center, the plan should reduce the thousands of provisional ballots from voters that visit the wrong polling place that have <u>slowed vote</u> counts in past elections.

Even Hopkins, the Buckeye Republican, despite his concerns, generally supports the plan.

"To me it seems like it would be more cost effective and give people more opportunity to vote," he said. "I went in there (to the ballot center demonstration) with a closed mind that it's going to be terrible. And I came out thinking most of it was pretty good."

R2-20-702(B) Option A:

A participating candidate's payment from a campaign bank account to a political committee or civic organization including a person with tax exempt status under section 501(a) of the internal revenue code or an unincorporated association is not a contribution if the payment is reasonable in relation to the value received. Payment of customary charges for services rendered, such as for printing and obtaining voter or telephone lists, and payment of not more than \$200 per person to attend a political event open to the public or to party members shall be considered reasonable in relation to the value received. Clean elections funding shall not be used for an expenditure to any political party and such an expenditure shall be deemed an illegal contribution.

R2-20-702(B) Option B:

A participating candidate's payment from a campaign bank account to a political committee or civic organization including a person with tax exempt status under section 501(a) of the internal revenue code or an unincorporated association entity is not a contribution if the payment is reasonable in relation to the value received. Payment of customary charges for services rendered such as for printing and obtaining voter or telephone lists, and payment of not more than \$200 per person to attend a political event open to the public or to party members shall be considered reasonable in relation to the value received. No other payments are permitted to political parties with clean elections funding.

R2-20-702(B) Option C:

A participating candidate's payment from a campaign account to a political committee or civic organization entity is not a contribution if the payment is reasonable in relation to the value received. Payment of customary charges for services rendered such as for printing voter or telephone lists, and payment of not more than \$200 per person to attend a political event open to the public or to party members shall be considered reasonable in relation to the value received.

A participating candidate may:

- 1. Make a payment from the candidate's campaign bank account:
 - a. To a political committee or civic organization including a person with tax exempt status under section 501(a) of the internal revenue code or an unincorporated association. The payment is not a contribution if the payment is reasonable in relation to the value received.
 - b. For customary charges for services
 rendered, such as for printing and obtaining
 voter or telephone lists, shall be considered
 reasonable in relation to the value received.
 - c. Of not more than \$200 per person to attend a political event open to the public or to

- <u>party members shall be considered</u> <u>reasonable in relation to the value received.</u>
- 2. Only make an advanced payment to a political party for services such as consulting, communications, field employees, canvassers, mailers, auto-dialers, telephone town halls, electronic communications and other advertising purchases and other campaign services if an itemized invoice identifying the value of the service is provided directly to the participating candidate at the time of the advanced payment.
 - a. Payment in the absence of an itemized invoice or advanced payment for such services shall be deemed a contribution to the political party.
 - b. Payment may be advanced for postage upon the receipt of a written estimate and so long as any balance is returned to the candidate if the advance exceeds the actual cost of the postage.
 - c. Payment may be advanced for advertising that customarily requires pre-payment upon the receipt of a written estimate and so long as any balance is returned to the

- candidate if the advance exceeds the actual cost of the advertisement.
- d. A political party may not mark up or add any additional charge to the value of services provided to the particular candidate. All expenditures must be for the services used by the particular participating candidate.
- e. The Commission shall be included in the mail batch for all mailers and invitations.

 The Commission shall also be provided with documentation from the mail house, printer or other original source showing the number of mailers printed and the number of households to which a mailer was sent. Failure to provide this information within 7 days after a mailer has been mailed may be considered as evidence the mailer was not for direct campaign purposes.

R2-20-703.01 Campaign Consultants (NEW RULE)

- A. For purposes of this rule "Campaign Consultant" means any person paid by a participating candidate's campaign or who provides services that are ordinarily charged to a person, except services provided for in A.R.S. 16-911(6)(b).
- B. A participating candidate may engage campaign consultants.
- C. A participating candidate may only advance a campaign consultant for services such as consulting, communications, field employees, canvassers, mailers, auto-dialers, telephone town halls, electronic communications and other advertising purchases and other campaign service if an -itemized invoice identifying the value of the services is provided directly to that particular candidate at the time of the advance payment. The invoice shall also identify the consultant's mark up, percentage or other additional charge above the actual cost of the service provided
 - 1. Providing payment for such services as described in subsection (C) of this rule in the absence of an itemized invoice or advance payment for such services shall be deemed not to be a direct campaign expenditure.

- 2. A participating candidate may advance payment for postage upon the receipt of a written estimate and so long as any balance is returned to the candidate if the advance exceeds the actual cost of postage.
- 3. A participating candidate may advance payment for advertising that customarily requires prepayment upon the receipt of a written estimate and so long as any balance is returned to the candidate if the advance exceeds the actual cost of the advertisement.
- D. The Commission shall be included in the mail batch for all mailers and invitations. The Commission shall also be provided with documentation from the mail house, printer or other original source showing the number of mailers printed and the number of households to which a mailer was sent. Failure to provide this information within 7 days after the mailer has been mailed may be considered as evidence the mailer was not for direct campaign purposes.
- E. Any consultant engaged by a participating candidate shall provide the participating candidate and the Commission with a sworn affidavit identifying all other clients who are: candidates for any office in the state of Arizona, political committees, a person

with tax exempt status under section 501(a) of the internal revenue code, or an unincorporated association, or corporations engaged independent expenditures in the state of Arizona. This affidavit shall be updated monthly beginning the first of the month of every month of the remaining election cycle. In the event the relationship is terminated a sworn affidavit so stating shall be provided to the participating candidate and the commission within 5 days.

R2-20-402.01. Random a Audits of participating legislative candidates.

To ensure compliance with the Act and Commission rules, the Commission shall conduct random audits of <u>all</u> participating legislative candidates after each <u>election primary election</u> period and each general election period. Candidates who win their primary election will not be <u>subject to an audit until after the general election.</u> Random a Audits shall include the review of campaign finance reports for the entire election cycle and related documentation in accordance with procedures established by the Commission. The Commission may hire independent accounting firms to carry out the random audits. The selection of legislative candidates for audit shall be determined by random lot at a Commission meeting. Candidates shall not be subject to selection for random audit for the general election period that were selected for random audit following the primary election period.

As a Clean Elections candidate and a current member of the Arizona House of Representatives, I would like to comment on the proposed rule changes which will be voted on at the 6/22 meeting.

First of all, thank you so much for tackling this topic. I don't like what happened in 2016 regarding transferring all or most Clean Elections funds from certain candidates to political parties or consultants, and I welcome reform by the commission.

I prefer R2-20-702(B) Option C plus the new rule R2-20-703.01 Campaign Consultants.

These two rules together tackle the entire problem because it addresses parties and consultants. My only concern about Option C is item e because of the added complexity and short time frame. I understand the intent of C:e, but perhaps there is a simpler way to gain that information. Please - yes on these two.

R2-20-702(B) Option A would be very bad for Clean Elections candidates because it would preclude us from buying legitimate services from a political party. Under Option A, Democratic candidates would not have access to the Democratic Party's VAN database for targeting mailings, phone banking and walks or for voter contact data-gathering. Option A would force Clean Elections candidates to run without that valuable information or to buy it from national vendors, which could be expensive and of variable quality. Option A also doesn't address funds transferred to consultants. No on Option A.

R2-20-702(B) Option B allows candidates to buy lists from political parties but not other services like renting the predictive dialer. Option B also doesn't address funds transferred to consultants. No on Option B.

Thanks for the opportunity to comment. I believe that Clean Elections should be strengthened and expanded-- not diminished.

My name is Brandon Dwyer. I was a clean elections candidate for the 2016 election cycle and am currently thinking about running as a clean candidate again in 2018.

R2-20-702(B) Option A.

I would not run as a clean elections candidate again. Chances are I wouldn't run in 2018 if this option passed.

R2-20-702(B) Option B.

I used my normal campaign funds to purchase access to the voter file. I would have trouble running as a clean elections candidate again. More likely I wouldn't run in 2018 if this option passed.

R2-20-702(B) Option C. Sets out some great starting ground rules. If these rules where in place before the 2016 campaign it would have made life easier. I only have objections with one section.

R2-20-702(B) Option C Section F. The Commission shall also be provided with documentation from the mail house, printer or other original source showing the number of mailers printed and the number of households to which a mailer was sent. Failure to provide this information within seven days after a mailer has been mailed may be considered as evidence the mailer was not for direct campaign purposes.

This sets an undo burden on the printing house. It has also been my experience that print shops typically do not respond in a timely manner if at all. Many times I had to physically show up to their place of business to get a response or solve a problem. The candidate should submit the final invoices to the clean elections commission within seven business days. This extra burden will cause some print shops to turn away candidates.

Getting a print shop to do anything in a timely manor let alone extra uncompensated paperwork will lead to multiple violations from multiple campaigns.

On behalf of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission ("Commission"), the Executive Director hereby provides the Statement of Reasons showing reason to believe that violations of the Citizens Clean Elections Act and or the Commission rules (collectively, the "Act") may have occurred.

I. Procedural Background

Jesus Rubalcava ("Respondent"), a 2016 participating candidate for State Representative of Legislative District 4, was selected for a random primary election audit on September 15, 2016. Based on findings from the random audit (**Exhibit A**), the Commission approved a comprehensive audit and review for Respondent and Respondent's candidate campaign committee on January 19, 2017. On April 28, 2017, the independent auditors, Fester & Chapman P.C., submitted the final comprehensive audit to the Commission (**Exhibit B**).

On May 23, 2017, the Executive Director served Respondent with an internal Complaint regarding the findings of the comprehensive audit and review (**Exhibit C**). The Complaint alleges Respondent may have violated the Clean Elections Act and Rules by: (1) accepting contributions other than individual contributions and \$5 qualifying contributions; (2) making expenditures in excess of the personal money contribution limit; (3) making expenditures in excess of the adjusted primary election spending limit; (4) making expenditures in excess of the adjusted general election spending limit; (5) failing to comply with A.R.S. §16-948 regarding campaign accounts; and (6) failing to comply with A.R.S. §16-953 regarding the return of unused monies to the Citizens Clean Elections Fund. The Complaint also noticed Respondent of potential reporting violations and related penalties.

On May 30, 2017, Respondent submitted a Response to the Complaint (Exhibit D).

Because of the audit and Respondent's related admissions noted below, it is clear that numerous violations may have occurred. The failure to document transactions properly, coupled with the usage of funds and dual bank accounts noted in the audits, gives rise to potentially serious violations. An investigation will determine whether there is probable cause to believe a violation has occurred, as well as the scope of the violation.

II. Alleged Violations

A. Exceeding early contribution limit

Pursuant to A.R.S. §16-941(A)(1), a participating candidate shall not accept any contributions, other than a limited number of five-dollar qualifying and early individual contributions.

The auditors found that Respondent made transfers from a separate bank account to the campaign bank account totaling \$1,869.33 and made additional deposits, whose purpose cannot be determined, into the campaign bank account in the amount of \$3,945.54. Respondent's Amended June 30th Report details that Respondent collected \$1,415 in qualifying contributions (**Exhibit E**). Respondent's Amended Qualifying Period Recap Report details that Respondent received \$177 in personal and family contributions, \$525 in early individual contributions, and \$60 in small contributions (**Exhibit F**). The total combined amount of received contributions as reported by Respondent is \$2,177. Respondent deposited into his bank account a total of \$5,814.87 (not including Clean Elections Funding); this is \$3,637.87 more than the total combined qualifying contributions, individual contributions, small contributions, and personal and family contributions Respondent reported on his campaign finance reports.

In his Response, Respondent states he did accept contributions other than the \$5 qualifying contributions, but he received early contributions from individuals and referenced his campaign finance reports as an exhibit. However, the campaign finance reports referenced by Respondent do not match the deposits made in the bank account. Moreover, Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle.") (**Exhibit G**); accord Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing."). Additionally, Respondent failed to provide sufficient documentation for all campaign activity in his campaign finance reports, pursuant to R2-20-104. As such, the auditors and Commission staff are unable to determine if contributions comply with the limits. A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(1) ("[A] participating candidate. . . [s]hall not accept any contributions, other than a limited number of five-dollar qualifying contributions as specified in section 16-946 and early contributions as specified in section 16-945, except in the emergency situation specified in section 16-954, subsection F.").

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred.

B. Exceeding the limit for expenditures paid with personal monies

Pursuant to A.R.S. §16-941(A)(2), a participating legislative candidate shall not make expenditures of more than a total of seven hundred and twenty dollars of the candidate's personal monies.

The auditors found that Respondent had made transfers from a separate bank account to the campaign bank account totaling \$1,869.33 and made additional deposits, whose purpose cannot be determined, into the campaign bank account in the amount of \$3,945.54. If Respondent only received \$2,000 from his qualifying contributions, early individual contributions, and small contributions combined, as reported on his campaign finance reports, then Respondent received \$3,814.87 in personal and family contributions. Respondent only reported receiving \$177 in personal and family contributions.

In his Response, Respondent states he contributed \$177 of his personal money to his campaign. However, Respondent failed to provide sufficient documentation for all campaign activity, as required by R2-20-104. Again, Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle."); accord Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing."). As such, the auditors and Commission staff are unable to determine if use of personal monies is within the limits. A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(2)("[A] participating candidate. . . shall not make expenditures of more than a total of five hundred dollars of the candidate's personal monies for a candidate for the legislature or more than one thousand dollars for a candidate for statewide office.").

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred.

C. Exceeding general election spending limit

Pursuant to A.R.S. $\S\S16-941(A)(3)$ and -941(A)(4), a participating candidate shall not make expenditures exceeding the adjusted primary spending limit ($\S16,044$) and adjusted general spending limit ($\S1,415$).

The auditors found that Respondent made a total of \$3,677.16 in expenditures from the campaign bank account during the general election period (August 31, 2016 through November 8, 2016). Respondent's adjusted general election spending limit was \$1,415 since Respondent was not contested in the general election. Respondent made a total of \$2,262.16 in excess expenditures during the general election period.

In his Response, Respondent states that he "did not exceed the amount of the general election spending limit." He also states that he did not receive general election funding because he was unopposed and learned that he was unopposed in late September. However, Respondent did receive general funding on August 31, 2016 (**Exhibit H**) but it was determined that Respondent would be unopposed in the general election; therefore, the next day on September 1, 2016, Respondent was notified by the Executive Director, through e-mail and overnight delivery, that he would need to return \$22,651 in general election funding and he could only retain the amount of the \$5 qualifying contributions (\$1,415) he submitted to the Secretary of State's Office (**Exhibit I**). Respondent acknowledged the notification the same day but did not return the general election funds until September 28, 2016.

Respondent also provides his campaign finance reports as evidence that he did not exceed the general election spending limit. However, the auditors found that Respondent's campaign finance reports do not accurately reflect the campaign finance activity in the Respondent's campaign bank account. Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle."); accord Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing."). The auditors found that \$2,829.61 in expenditures

from the campaign bank account during the general election period were not reported on Respondent's campaign finance reports.

The auditors requested supporting documentation for the expenditures but Respondent claimed to have been unable to "locate the box" containing the information. Every Clean Elections candidate has the burden of proving expenditures are made for direct campaign purposes, pursuant to A.A.C. R2-20-104(C). We are unable to determine whether expenditures were for direct campaign purposes and in compliance with the adjusted general spending limit. A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(4)("[A] participating candidate . . . [s]hall not make expenditures in the general election period in excess of the adjusted general election spending limit.").

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred.

D. Failure to return unused monies to the Commission after the primary and general elections and exceeding the primary election spending limit.

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(5), participating candidates must comply with A.R.S. §16-953 stating that at the end of the primary and general elections participating candidates must return monies in the campaign account to the Commission.

The auditors found a transfer from the Respondent's campaign bank account to Respondent's personal account equaling \$604.42. Respondent made \$4,653.41 in non-campaign withdrawals from the campaign bank account. An additional \$3,635.41 was withdrawn and auditors were unable to provide a determinable purpose. Participating candidates must return Clean Elections funding that was not used for direct campaign purposes, as required by R2-20-704(B).

On October 18, 2016, the auditors contacted Respondent regarding a high ending balance on the Primary Recap Report (**Exhibit J**). At that time Respondent should have returned \$7,046.72 in unspent primary election funding based on the timely filing of his Primary Recap Report (**Exhibit K**). On November 1, 2016, Respondent filed amendments to his campaign finance reports. The new ending balance on the Amended Primary Recap Report was -\$2.44 (**Exhibit L**).

The auditors found that Respondent made \$17,501.51 in expenditures from the campaign bank account during the primary election period. Since Respondent could have only potentially deposited \$18,221 into the campaign bank account during the primary period (based upon primary election funding, early contributions, \$5 qualifying contributions, small contributions and personal contributions), Respondent should have returned to the Clean Elections Fund at least \$710.49. This does not take into account the expenditures that were made for personal use and should have also been returned to the fund. Moreover, absent evidence to support the expenditures during the primary, Respondent may have exceeded the primary spending limit he took on himself.

Respondent states that "according to the reports filed with the Arizona Secretary of State, there wasn't [sic] any unused monies that were not returned to the Citizens Clean Elections Commission." And that because his personal bank account and campaign account were linked, he "began to use the filing report with the Secretary of State as [his] accounting and balance." However, Respondent amended his reports several months after the transactions had taken place so it is improbable that he was able to utilize the Secretary of State's campaign finance reporting system to keep track of his campaign finance activity. Confirming this, Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle."); accord Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing.").

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred. A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(3) ("[A] [participating candidate. . . . [s]hall not make expenditures in the primary election period in excess of the adjusted primary election spending limit."); § 16-941(A)(5)([A] participating candidate. . . [s]hall comply with section . . section 16-953 regarding returning unused monies to the citizens clean elections fund described in this article.").

E. Failure to conduct campaign activity through a single bank account

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(5), participating candidates must comply with A.R.S. § 16-948 stating that all financial campaign activity must be conducted through a single campaign account and a participating candidate shall not make any deposits into the campaign bank account other than early and qualifying contributions. A.R.S. § 16-948(C) and R2-20-114(A) require candidates who establish a petty cash account to adhere to an aggregate limit of \$1,420 and each expenditure may not exceed \$160. Participating candidates utilizing petty cash accounts must include additional, detailed information on their campaign finance reports, as required by A.A.C. R2-20-115.

On June 15, 2016, Respondent physically received his check for the primary election. Bank records show that \$16,044 was deposited into a personal bank account and \$13,280.22 was transferred from Respondent's personal bank account to a campaign bank account on June 17, 2016. The difference of \$2,763.78 was not transferred to the campaign account. The auditors noted transfers from a separate bank account to the campaign account equaling \$1,869.33 and other deposits with undeterminable purposes equating to \$3,945.54. The deposits cannot be verified due to Respondent's failure to provide supporting documentation.

Respondent neglected to establish a petty cash account and provide detailed information on campaign finance reports. The auditors found ATM withdrawals totaling \$683.50 that Respondent failed to document on his campaign finance reports. The withdrawals cannot be verified due to the lack of supporting documentation. Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle."); *accord* Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing.").

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred. A.R.S. § 16-941(A)(5) ([A] participating candidate . . . [s]hall comply with section 16-948 regarding campaign accounts. . . .").

F. Failure to report expenditures and receipts

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-941, participating candidates shall comply with A.R.S. § 16-948 stating that candidates are required to report expenditures made directly from their campaign bank account, as required by A.R.S. § 16-948(C). Information to be provided on the campaign finance reports includes recipient's full name, address, nature of good and services, and compensation. A.A.C. R2-20-703 requires candidates to report all receipts and disbursements from the campaign account similarly. In addition, A.A.C. R2-20-115 contends that participating candidates maintain books and records of financial transactions in a single location, and such records be accessible upon request.

The auditors found that Respondent failed to report an aggregate of \$9,209.72 in expenditures and \$4,852.55 in deposits on his campaign finance reports. It could not be determined if an additional \$1,362.32 was reported because of insufficient records.

Respondent states that out of confusion he "began to use the filing report with the Secretary of State as [his] accounting and balance." As required by A.A.C. R2-20-110, participating candidates' campaign finance reports are to include all receipts and disbursements for their current campaign account. However, Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle."); accord Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing."). The comprehensive audit revealed several expenditures were made and not reported. Respondent made reference to his campaign finance reports submitted to the Secretary of State as proof against allegations of excess spending, but information in reports is recorded by the candidate and numerous expenditures and deposits were never documented by Respondent.

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred. A.R.S. § 16-942(B); Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-109 (2016).

G. Failure to utilize Clean Elections funding for direct campaign expenditures

Pursuant to A.R.S. §16-941, participating candidates shall comply with A.R.S. §16-948 stating that Clean Elections funding must be utilized only for direct campaign expenditures. Additionally, A.A.C. R2-20-702(C) prohibits participating candidates from using funds within the candidate's campaign account for personal use.

Auditors noted that Respondent transferred \$604.42 from his campaign bank account to Respondent's personal account. Respondent made \$4,653.41 in non-campaign withdrawals from the campaign bank account. An additional \$3,635.41 was withdrawn and auditors were unable to provide a determinable purpose. Non-campaign withdrawals are exemplified by, but not limited

to, Respondent's expenditures for: airline fees, hotel fees in the states of Tennessee, California, and the District of Columbia, and AT&T bill payments.

However, Respondent failed to provide sufficient documentation for all campaign activity including possible direct campaign expenditures, as required by R2-20-104. . Respondent does not "disput[e] the outcome of the audit." Clean Elections Commission Meeting, 5/18/2017, Tr. 30:8-11 ("I do acknowledge and I am taking responsibility that there was poor accounting and practices during this campaign cycle."); *accord* Response at 1 ("Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor I am denying any wrong doing."). As such, the auditors and Commission staff are unable to determine if any of the expenditures were for direct campaign purposes as required by A.R.S. §§16-941 and -948, A.A.C. R2-20-104 and R2-20-702(C) .

For the reasons set forth above, I recommend the Commission find reason to believe a violation may have occurred. *See* A.R.S. § 16-941(A).

III. Investigation After Reason to Believe Finding

If the Commission determines by an affirmative vote of at least three (3) of its members that it has reason to believe a respondent has violated a statute or rule over which the Commission has jurisdiction, the Commission shall notify such respondent of the Commission's finding setting forth: (i) the sections of the statute or rule alleged to have been violated; (ii) the alleged factual basis supporting the finding; and (iii) an order requiring compliance within fourteen (14) days. During that period, the Respondent may provide any explanation to the Commission, comply with the order, or enter into a public administrative settlement with the Commission. A.R.S. § 16-957(A) & A.A.C. R2-20-208(A).

After the Commission finds reason to believe that a violation of a statute or rule over which the Commission has jurisdiction has occurred, the Commission shall conduct an investigation. A.A.C. R2-20-209(A). The Commission may authorize the Executive Director to subpoena all of the Respondent's records documenting disbursements, debts, or obligations to the present, and may authorize further audits. I request that the Commission authorize such subpoenas now to allow the investigation to proceed in due course.

After fourteen (14) days and upon completion of the investigation, the Executive Director will recommend whether the Commission should find probable cause to believe that a violation of a statute or rule over which the Commission has jurisdiction has occurred. A.A.C. R2-20-214(A). Upon a finding of probable cause that the alleged violator remains out of compliance, by an affirmative vote of at least three (3) of its members, the Commission may issue of an order and assess civil penalties pursuant to A.R.S. § 16-957(B), including removal from office. A.A.C. R2-20-217. The Commission may order the repayment of funds expended in violation of A.A.C. R2-20-702. A.A.C. R2-20-704(B).

Independent Accountants' Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures

Chairman and Members of the Commission Citizens Clean Elections Commission Phoenix, Arizona

We (the Contractor) have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were specified and agreed to by the State of Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission (the Commission), solely to assist the Commission in evaluating whether Rubalcava for House (the Candidate) Campaign Finance Reports for both the Pre-Primary (June 1, 2016 to August 18, 2016) and the Post-Primary (August 19, 2016 to September 19, 2016) reporting periods were prepared in compliance with Title 16, Articles 1 and 2 of the Arizona Revised Statutes, Campaign Contributions and Expenses, and the Citizens Clean Elections Act, and whether the reports complied with the rules of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission. The Candidate's management is responsible for the Pre-Primary and Post-Primary Campaign Finance Reports. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and the associated findings are as follows:

1. Preliminary Procedures

a) Commission Staff will obtain a copy of the candidate's campaign finance report for the reporting period and provide the records to the Contractor.

Finding

We obtained both the Pre-Primary (June 1, 2016 to August 18, 2016) and Post-Primary (August 19, 2016 to September 19, 2016) Campaign Finance Reports from the Arizona Secretary of State's website.

b) Perform a desk review of the receipts reported in the candidate's campaign finance report as follows:

(i) Determine whether the candidate accepted contributions only from individuals.

Finding

The contributions received during the periods reviewed appeared to be only from individuals.

(ii) Determine whether any contributions received from individuals exceed the early contribution limit.

Finding

Contributions received from individuals during the periods reviewed did not exceed the \$160 early contribution limit.

(iii) Check compliance with the maximum early contribution limits.

Finding

Early contributions received during the periods reviewed did not exceed the \$4,011 limit for a legislative candidate.

(iv) Check compliance with the maximum personal contribution limits.

Finding

Early contributions received during the periods reviewed did not exceed the \$720 limit for a legislative candidate.

c) Perform a desk review of the disbursements reported in the candidate's campaign finance report to identify any unusual items requiring follow-up during fieldwork.

Finding

We noted six disbursements to family members of the candidate, however the Campaign finance report did not indicate that the expenditures were made to family members. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule R2-20-701(C)(4), all payments made to family members or to enterprises owned in whole or part by the candidate or a family member shall be clearly itemized and indicated as such in all campaign finance reports.

In addition, there were three loans outstanding on the Post-Primary finance report that were made to the Campaign by the Candidate in December 2015, totaling \$69.93, that do not appear to have been repaid to the Candidate. In addition, supporting documentation for these loans was not maintained by the Campaign. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rule Manual rule R2-20-104(E), if the loan is to be repaid, the loans shall be repaid promptly upon receipt of Clean Elections funds if the participating candidate qualifies for Clean Elections funding. The Campaign received its Clean Elections funding on June 15, 2016.

It was further noted that the Campaign finance report had significantly fewer transactions than what was shown on the Campaign bank statements. Per discussion with the Candidate, the financial institution linked his personal bank account with the Campaign bank account, and therefore when he used his personal debit card, the Campaign bank account was debited. We noted approximately forty-one personal transactions consisting of out of state restaurant purchases, travel and other non-Campaign related items on the Campaign bank statement, totaling \$3,461.74; three ATM withdrawals, totaling \$243.50; five overdraft fees, totaling \$175.00; and three transfers from the Campaign bank account to the Candidate's personal bank account, totaling \$223.42. The Candidate indicated that he reimbursed the Campaign for these personal transactions, however deposits for these specific amounts was not provided. We noted eleven possible reimbursements to the Campaign on the bank statements, totaling \$2,270.19.

d) Contact the candidate or the campaign treasurer, as appropriate, to schedule a date to perform fieldwork. Discuss the nature of the documentation, which will be needed to perform the engagement and ascertain the location of the necessary documentation.

Finding

We contacted the Candidate to discuss the agreed-upon procedures, the timing of our procedures, and the documentation needed.

2. Fieldwork Procedures

a) Commission staff will contact the candidate to request the records for an agreedupon procedures attest engagement. Candidates chosen for a Primary Election Audit shall provide records from the Pre-Primary Election Report and the Post-Primary Election Report. Candidates chosen for a General Election Audit shall provide records from the Pre-General Election Report and the Post-General Election Report.

Finding

Commission staff sent an initial notice of primary random audit selection to the Candidate and informed the Candidate that we would be contacting him. We then communicated to the Candidate in a written request, the purpose of the engagement, agreed-upon procedures to be performed, documentation needed and potential future requirements of the Candidate.

b) Commission staff will provide the records to the Contractor upon receipt. The Contractor shall contact the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the purpose of the engagement, the general procedures to be performed and potential future requirements of the candidate, such as possible repayments to the Fund.

Finding

See comment in a) above.

c) The Contractor shall contact or conduct an interview with the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the bookkeeping policies and procedures utilized by the campaign committee.

Finding

The Candidate provided written bookkeeping policies and procedures utilized by the campaign committee.

(i) Review the names of the candidate's family members. Family members include parents, grandparents, spouse, children, siblings and a parent or spouse of any of those persons.

Finding

We obtained and reviewed the names of the Candidate's family members.

- (ii) Review bank statements for each of the months in the reporting period and perform the following:
 - Select a sample of deposits and withdrawals from the bank statements and determine that the transaction is properly reflected in the candidate's records and campaign finance report.

Finding

We selected five deposits and five withdrawals from the bank statements for the periods reviewed and determined that none appeared to be properly recorded in the Candidate's campaign finance reports.

The five withdrawals tested were personal purchases, made by the Candidate, totaling \$1,454.72. Per discussion with the Candidate, the financial institution linked his personal bank account with the Campaign bank account, and therefore when he used his personal debit card, the Campaign bank account was debited. He indicated that he reimbursed the Campaign for the personal purchases, however deposits for these specific amounts was not provided. He further indicated that the errors continued after he notified the financial institution.

The five deposits tested, per discussion with the Candidate, were reimbursements to the Campaign for personal purchases made in error by the financial institution, totaling \$1,717.99.

It was further noted that the Campaign finance report included the Primary Election Commission funding totaling \$16,044.00 on 6/15/16. The Campaign bank account did not include a corresponding deposit for this amount, however it did include a transfer from the Candidate's personal bank account for \$13,280.22, which represents a variance of \$2,763.78 of Commission monies that does not appear to have been deposited into the Campaign bank account. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule 16-948(A), a participating candidate shall conduct all financial activity through a single campaign account of the candidate's campaign committee.

• Perform a proof of receipts and disbursements for the reporting period.

Finding

After performing proof of cash procedures, we calculated a Post-Primary ending cash balance of \$20,181.06, however the Amended Post-Primary campaign finance report reflected an ending balance of \$23,202.06, reflecting a variance of \$3,021.00, and indicating that the Campaign overspent by this amount. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule 16-941 (A)(3), a participating candidate: shall not make expenditures in the primary election period in excess of the adjusted primary election spending limit.

In addition, during this testwork it was noted that ten of the expenditure items in the Post-Primary campaign finance report, totaling \$2,214.50, had not cleared the bank as of September 30, 2016. Per discussion with the Candidate, he paid these vendors with cash, however no petty cash fund had been set up for the Campaign, and these expenditures were not reported as reimbursements to the Candidate on the Campaign finance report.

d) Judgmentally select a sample of early contributions reported in the candidate's campaign finance report and agree to supporting documentation, which reflects the name of the contributor (for all contributions) and for individuals who contributed greater than \$50, which reflects the contributor's address, occupation and employer.

Finding

We reviewed the supporting documentation for one early contribution (total population) reported in the Candidate's campaign finance report, and determined the name of the contributor for the contribution was included on the support. For individuals who contributed greater than \$50, we determined that the contributor's address, occupation and employer were also included on the support.

(i) For other types of cash receipts reported in the candidate's campaign finance report, review supporting documentation and review for compliance with regulatory rules and laws and agree the receipt to inclusion in the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

No other types of cash receipts were reported in the Candidate's campaign finance reports during the periods reviewed.

(ii) For in-kind contributions, review the supporting documentation and determine the methodology utilized to value the contribution and assess the reasonableness.

Finding

No in-kind contributions were reported in the Candidate's campaign finance reports during the periods reviewed.

- e) Judgmentally select a sample of cash expenditures reported in the candidate's campaign finance report and perform the following:
 - (i) Review supporting invoice or other documentation and agree amount to the amount reported in the candidate's finance report.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed amounts to supporting invoices or other documentation and to the Candidate's finance report, with no exceptions noted.

(ii) Determine that the name, address and nature of goods or services provided agree to the information reported in the candidate's campaign finance report.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed the name, address and nature of goods or services provided to the information reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance report with no exceptions noted, however three of the expenditures tested were made were to family members of the Candidate and the Campaign finance report did not indicate that they were family members. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule R2-20-701(C)(4), all payments made to family members or to enterprises owned in whole or part by the candidate or a family member shall be clearly itemized and indicated as such in all campaign finance reports.

Agree the amount of the expenditure to the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed amounts to the campaign account bank statements with one exception. The Campaign finance report included a \$264.50 expenditure for newspaper advertising, however this amount was not present on the Campaign bank statement. Per discussion with the Candidate, he paid this vendor in cash, however no petty cash fund had been set up for the Campaign and this expenditure was not reported as a reimbursement to the Candidate on the Campaign finance report.

(iii) Determine whether the expenditure was made for a direct campaign purpose. Direct campaign purpose includes, but is not limited to, materials, communications, transportation, supplies and expenses used toward the election of the candidate.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed the name, address and nature of goods or services provided to the information reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance report with no exceptions noted.

• If the expenditure is a joint expenditure made in conjunction with other candidates, determine that the amount paid represents the candidate's proportionate share of the total cost.

Finding

None of the expenditures we tested appeared to be for joint expenditures.

f) Determine whether any petty cash funds have been established and, if so, determine how expenditures from these funds have been reflected in the accounting records. Determine whether aggregate petty cash funds exceed the limit of \$1,420.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Candidate did not establish a petty cash fund during the periods reviewed, however per review of the Campaign bank statement, several ATM withdrawals were made and per discussion with the Candidate, multiple vendors were paid with cash.

(i) If applicable, judgmentally select a sample of expenditures made from the Candidate's petty cash fund(s) and obtain supporting documentation for the expenditure. Determine whether the expenditure was for a direct campaign expense and whether the expenditure was in excess of the \$160 limit on petty cash expenditures.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Candidate did not establish a petty cash fund during the periods reviewed.

g) Determine whether a legal defense fund has been established.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the campaign did not establish a legal defense fund.

(i) If a legal defense fund was established, how were these funds accounted for?

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the campaign did not establish a legal defense fund.

h) Contact the Candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the preliminary engagement findings and recommendations that the Contractor anticipates presenting to the CCEC. During this conference, the Contractor will advise the Candidate and/or his or her representative(s) of their right to respond to the preliminary findings and the projected timetable for the issuance of the final issuance of the report.

Finding

We discussed our findings with the Candidate and the Candidate did not provide responses to our findings.

We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion on the Pre-Primary and Post-Primary Campaign Finance Reports of Rubalcava for House. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than this specified party.

Independent Accountants' Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures

Chairman and Members of the Commission Citizens Clean Elections Commission Phoenix, Arizona

We (the Contractor) have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were specified and agreed to by the State of Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission (the Commission), solely to assist the Commission in evaluating whether Rubalcava for House (the Candidate), Campaign Finance Reports, Campaign bank account and corresponding documentation for expenditures and contributions for the 2016 election cycle (January 15, 2016 to January 31, 2017) were prepared or maintained in compliance with Title 16, Articles 1 and 2 of the Arizona Revised Statutes, Campaign Contributions and Expenses, and the Citizens Clean Elections Act, and whether the reports complied with the rules of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission. The Candidate's management is responsible for the Campaign Finance Reports. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and the associated findings are as follows:

- 1. The Contractor shall review bank statements for each of the months in the election cycle and perform the following:
 - a) Select 100% of the deposits and withdrawals from the campaign bank statements and determine that the transaction is properly reflected in the candidate's records and campaign finance report.

Finding

The Candidate provided the Campaign bank statements for all months of the election cycle, however the Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the deposits and withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements. The attached Bank Statement Deposit Summary and Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the deposits and withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

- b) Select 100% of cash disbursements and withdrawals from the campaign bank statement and perform the following:
 - (i) Review supporting invoice or other documentation and agree amount to the amount reported in the candidate's finance report.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

(ii) Determine that the name, address and nature of goods or services provided agree to the information reported in the candidate's campaign finance report.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements, therefore the name, address and nature of goods or services provided could not be agreed to the information reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance report. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

(iii) Determine whether the expenditure was made for a direct campaign purpose. Direct campaign purpose includes, but is not limited to, materials, communications, transportation, supplies and expenses used toward the election of the candidate.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements, therefore expenditures made for a direct Campaign purpose could not be determined. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

• If the expenditure is a joint expenditure made in conjunction with other candidates, determine that the amount paid represents the candidate's proportionate share of the total cost.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements, therefore joint expenditures were unable to be identified. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

c) Determine whether a legal defense has been established.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Campaign did not establish a legal defense.

(i) Has any Clean funding been used to pay for legal services?

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Campaign did not establish a legal defense.

(ii) What is the cost or value of legal services being provided for the comprehensive audit and review of the finance activity?

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Campaign did not establish a legal defense.

d) Contact the Candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the preliminary engagement findings and recommendations that the Contractor anticipates presenting to the CCEC. During this notification, the Contractor will advise the Candidate and/or his or her representative(s) of their right to respond to the preliminary findings and the projected timetable for the issuance of the final issuance of the report.

Finding

We discussed our findings with the Candidate and the Candidate provided responses to our findings, which are included on pages 14-15 of this report.

We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion on the comprehensive audit and review of the finance activity of Rubalcava for House. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than this specified party.

Dear Chairman and Members,

I would like to start off by thanking you for the opportunity to participate as a participating candidate in the 2016 Election Cycle. Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor am I denying any wrong doing. More so, this is acknowledgement that my campaign finances were not effectively run and that my lesson has been learned. Moving forward, should I be given the opportunity, I now know what to do and what not to do. This letter is to explain and clarify some questions you may have in regards to the issues and concerns brought before you.

It is important to know that this was my first time running for such position. I had never had to file full campaign accounts and never had to form a committee for the purpose of running for office. Many things I did not know. For example, I did not know that I needed to set up a petty cash account. I did not know where or how to disclose family members that worked for my campaign. I did not know that I needed to hire legal counsel. I did call the Citizens Clean Elections Commission office twice to ask for 1) what or how much to pay individuals working for the campaign and 2) where to obtain a mileage reimbursement form. I did not receive a concrete answer for either questions, rather was told to attend the CCEC Orientation again. Again, this is not justification or an excuse.

The biggest issue with my campaign was that I used my bank account that linked with my campaign account. For example, I would deposit a check into what I thought was one account and it would end up

in another. Another example, I would use my campaign debit card for a transaction and it would

withdraw from my personal account. Because this was so confusing to me, I began to use the filing

report with the Secretary of State as my accounting and balance.

I was not able to provide additional documentation other than my bank statements for the following

reason. I am a Special Education teacher in the Buckeye Elementary School District. When going through

my initial audit, I had all of my campaign documents in my classroom. Over holiday break, I was moved

into different classrooms 2 times. During this time, many of my personal belongings and documents

were misplaced. I still have not been able to relocate them.

I ask the commission to please consider the reasoning for such flaws in this campaign finance. I accept

the report on findings as a way to acknowledge and learn from what was done incorrectly and how to

do things the correct way. I am willing to accept the consequences of my wrongdoing and ask that the

commission allow me to take corrective actions in order to comply; whether this be repaying back any

unaccounted monies and fees set forth by the commission.

This letter serves as an internal complaint against you by the Executive Director of the Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission.

Complaint

Recently, the Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission accepted an audit of your campaign finances from the 2016 election. This comprehensive review, which followed a random audit related to the primary period, raised a number of issues related to the financing of your campaign as a participating candidate under the Citizens Clean Elections Act. Indeed, the audit provides substantial evidence that you may have violated a number of provisions of the Clean Elections Act and Rules.

According to the audit, you are unable to locate any documentation supporting your withdrawals from the campaign bank account, nor the identities or any contact information relating to goods and services purchases reported on your campaign finance reports, documentation of direct campaign expenditures or joint expenditures. The two audit reviews also confirm that you maintained more than one bank account that was used for campaign purposes throughout the campaign. Additionally, the reviews show that at no time did you deposit the entirety of your primary clean funding into your campaign bank account, that more than the primary and general limits applicable to you passed through the campaign bank account, and that bank account records and your campaign finance reports do not match. Among other things, the auditors were unable to reconcile deposits with claimed contributions noted on your campaign finance reports.

These allegations raise numerous potential violations. Participating candidates:

- 1. Shall not accept any contributions, other than a limited number of five-dollar qualifying contributions as specified in section 16-946 and early contributions as specified in section 16-945, except in the emergency situation specified in section 16-954, subsection F.
- 2. Shall not make expenditures of more than a total of five hundred dollars of the candidate's personal monies for a candidate for the legislature or more than one thousand dollars for a candidate for statewide office.
- 3. Shall not make expenditures in the primary election period in excess of the adjusted primary election spending limit.
- 4. Shall not make expenditures in the general election period in excess of the adjusted general election spending limit.
- 5. Shall comply with section 16-948 regarding campaign accounts and section 16-953 regarding returning unused monies to the citizens clean elections fund described in this article.

A.R.S. § 16-941(A). The audits provide evidence none of these requirements were complied with.

For example, A.R.S. § 16-953 (A) and (B) provide that "[a]t the end of the [primary or general] election period, a participating candidate. . . shall return to the fund all monies in the candidate's campaign account above an amount sufficient to pay any unpaid bills for expenditures made during the . . . election period and for goods or services directed to the . . . election." In the absence of evidence that monies provided from the Clean Elections Commission were used for campaign expenditures, any unaccounted dollars became due to the fund under A.R.S. §§ 16-941 and 953.

Likewise, A.R.S. § 16-948 provides that a participating candidate "shall conduct all financial activity through a single campaign account of the candidate's campaign committee. A participating candidate shall not make any deposits into the campaign account other than those permitted under section 16-945 or 16-946." (Emphasis added). Here, the audit reports are replete with indications you used more than one bank account and made multiple deposits from undetermined sources. This provides substantial evidence of ongoing violations on A.R.S. 16-941(A)(5) throughout the campaign, as well as 941(A)(1) and (A)(2).

Additionally, the auditors were unable to determine if direct campaign expenditures, joint expenditures, or other expenditures and contributions were made or accepted and properly reported. *See* Ariz. Admin. Code §§ R2-20-104, 109, 110, 111, 702, 703, 704 (2016).

Penalties for violating the Citizens Clean Elections Act and Rules include fines, repayment, and other penalties, including, in certain cases, removal from office. *See* A.R.S. §16-942(A)-(D); Ariz. Admin. Code §§ R2-20-222, -704.

Opportunity for Response

Commission rules require notification to be given to the Respondent of a Complaint. Ariz. Admin. Code § R2-20-204(A). Additionally, the rules provide that you be advised of compliance procedures. Those procedures are set forth in Article 2 of the Commission's Rules (Arizona Administrative Code Sections R2-20-201 to R2-20-228) as well as the Clean Elections

Act (specifically Arizona Revised Statutes §§ 16-940 to 16-961), which are available on the Commission website at www.azcleanelections.gov.

The Commission's rules provide that a Respondent "be afforded an opportunity to demonstrate that no action should be taken on the basis of a complaint by submitting, within five days from receipt of a written copy of the complaint, a letter or memorandum setting forth reasons why the Commission should take no action." Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-205(A). Your response must be notarized, or the Commission will not consider it. Ariz. Admin. Code R2-20-205(C). Generally, a failure to respond to a complaint within five days may be viewed as an admission to the allegations. *Id*.

Commission rules require that you be given this notice and Complaint. The issuance of this notice and Complaint do not constitute a finding related to the Complaint. A finding, if any, may be made only after the Commission has reviewed the matter. Additionally, I would recommend you seek legal counsel, as the Commission and its staff cannot provide legal advice to you.

Independent Accountants' Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures

Chairman and Members of the Commission Citizens Clean Elections Commission Phoenix, Arizona

We (the Contractor) have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were specified and agreed to by the State of Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission (the Commission), solely to assist the Commission in evaluating whether Rubalcava for House (the Candidate) Campaign Finance Reports for both the Pre-Primary (June 1, 2016 to August 18, 2016) and the Post-Primary (August 19, 2016 to September 19, 2016) reporting periods were prepared in compliance with Title 16, Articles 1 and 2 of the Arizona Revised Statutes, Campaign Contributions and Expenses, and the Citizens Clean Elections Act, and whether the reports complied with the rules of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission. The Candidate's management is responsible for the Pre-Primary and Post-Primary Campaign Finance Reports. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and the associated findings are as follows:

1. Preliminary Procedures

a) Commission Staff will obtain a copy of the candidate's campaign finance report for the reporting period and provide the records to the Contractor.

Finding

We obtained both the Pre-Primary (June 1, 2016 to August 18, 2016) and Post-Primary (August 19, 2016 to September 19, 2016) Campaign Finance Reports from the Arizona Secretary of State's website.

b) Perform a desk review of the receipts reported in the candidate's campaign finance report as follows:

(i) Determine whether the candidate accepted contributions only from individuals.

Finding

The contributions received during the periods reviewed appeared to be only from individuals.

(ii) Determine whether any contributions received from individuals exceed the early contribution limit.

Finding

Contributions received from individuals during the periods reviewed did not exceed the \$160 early contribution limit.

(iii) Check compliance with the maximum early contribution limits.

Finding

Early contributions received during the periods reviewed did not exceed the \$4,011 limit for a legislative candidate.

(iv) Check compliance with the maximum personal contribution limits.

Finding

Early contributions received during the periods reviewed did not exceed the \$720 limit for a legislative candidate.

c) Perform a desk review of the disbursements reported in the candidate's campaign finance report to identify any unusual items requiring follow-up during fieldwork.

Finding

We noted six disbursements to family members of the candidate, however the Campaign finance report did not indicate that the expenditures were made to family members. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule R2-20-701(C)(4), all payments made to family members or to enterprises owned in whole or part by the candidate or a family member shall be clearly itemized and indicated as such in all campaign finance reports.

In addition, there were three loans outstanding on the Post-Primary finance report that were made to the Campaign by the Candidate in December 2015, totaling \$69.93, that do not appear to have been repaid to the Candidate. In addition, supporting documentation for these loans was not maintained by the Campaign. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rule Manual rule R2-20-104(E), if the loan is to be repaid, the loans shall be repaid promptly upon receipt of Clean Elections funds if the participating candidate qualifies for Clean Elections funding. The Campaign received its Clean Elections funding on June 15, 2016.

It was further noted that the Campaign finance report had significantly fewer transactions than what was shown on the Campaign bank statements. Per discussion with the Candidate, the financial institution linked his personal bank account with the Campaign bank account, and therefore when he used his personal debit card, the Campaign bank account was debited. We noted approximately forty-one personal transactions consisting of out of state restaurant purchases, travel and other non-Campaign related items on the Campaign bank statement, totaling \$3,461.74; three ATM withdrawals, totaling \$243.50; five overdraft fees, totaling \$175.00; and three transfers from the Campaign bank account to the Candidate's personal bank account, totaling \$223.42. The Candidate indicated that he reimbursed the Campaign for these personal transactions, however deposits for these specific amounts was not provided. We noted eleven possible reimbursements to the Campaign on the bank statements, totaling \$2,270.19.

d) Contact the candidate or the campaign treasurer, as appropriate, to schedule a date to perform fieldwork. Discuss the nature of the documentation, which will be needed to perform the engagement and ascertain the location of the necessary documentation.

Finding

We contacted the Candidate to discuss the agreed-upon procedures, the timing of our procedures, and the documentation needed.

2. Fieldwork Procedures

a) Commission staff will contact the candidate to request the records for an agreed-upon procedures attest engagement. Candidates chosen for a Primary Election Audit shall provide records from the Pre-Primary Election Report and the Post-Primary Election Report. Candidates chosen for a General Election Audit shall provide records from the Pre-General Election Report and the Post-General Election Report.

Finding

Commission staff sent an initial notice of primary random audit selection to the Candidate and informed the Candidate that we would be contacting him. We then communicated to the Candidate in a written request, the purpose of the engagement, agreed-upon procedures to be performed, documentation needed and potential future requirements of the Candidate.

b) Commission staff will provide the records to the Contractor upon receipt. The Contractor shall contact the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the purpose of the engagement, the general procedures to be performed and potential future requirements of the candidate, such as possible repayments to the Fund.

Finding

See comment in a) above.

c) The Contractor shall contact or conduct an interview with the candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the bookkeeping policies and procedures utilized by the campaign committee.

Finding

The Candidate provided written bookkeeping policies and procedures utilized by the campaign committee.

(i) Review the names of the candidate's family members. Family members include parents, grandparents, spouse, children, siblings and a parent or spouse of any of those persons.

We obtained and reviewed the names of the Candidate's family members.

- (ii) Review bank statements for each of the months in the reporting period and perform the following:
 - Select a sample of deposits and withdrawals from the bank statements and determine that the transaction is properly reflected in the candidate's records and campaign finance report.

Finding

We selected five deposits and five withdrawals from the bank statements for the periods reviewed and determined that none appeared to be properly recorded in the Candidate's campaign finance reports.

The five withdrawals tested were personal purchases, made by the Candidate, totaling \$1,454.72. Per discussion with the Candidate, the financial institution linked his personal bank account with the Campaign bank account, and therefore when he used his personal debit card, the Campaign bank account was debited. He indicated that he reimbursed the Campaign for the personal purchases, however deposits for these specific amounts was not provided. He further indicated that the errors continued after he notified the financial institution.

The five deposits tested, per discussion with the Candidate, were reimbursements to the Campaign for personal purchases made in error by the financial institution, totaling \$1,717.99.

It was further noted that the Campaign finance report included the Primary Election Commission funding totaling \$16,044.00 on 6/15/16. The Campaign bank account did not include a corresponding deposit for this amount, however it did include a transfer from the Candidate's personal bank account for \$13,280.22, which represents a variance of \$2,763.78 of Commission monies that does not appear to have been deposited into the Campaign bank account. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule 16-948(A), a participating candidate shall conduct all financial activity through a single campaign account of the candidate's campaign committee.

 Perform a proof of receipts and disbursements for the reporting period.

Finding

After performing proof of cash procedures, we calculated a Post-Primary ending cash balance of \$20,181.06, however the Amended Post-Primary campaign finance report reflected an ending balance of \$23,202.06, reflecting a variance of \$3,021.00, and indicating that the Campaign overspent by this amount. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule 16-941 (A)(3), a participating candidate: shall not make expenditures in the primary election period in excess of the adjusted primary election spending limit.

In addition, during this testwork it was noted that ten of the expenditure items in the Post-Primary campaign finance report, totaling \$2,214.50, had not cleared the bank as of September 30, 2016. Per discussion with the Candidate, he paid these vendors with cash, however no petty cash fund had been set up for the Campaign, and these expenditures were not reported as reimbursements to the Candidate on the Campaign finance report.

d) Judgmentally select a sample of early contributions reported in the candidate's campaign finance report and agree to supporting documentation, which reflects the name of the contributor (for all contributions) and for individuals who contributed greater than \$50, which reflects the contributor's address, occupation and employer.

Finding

We reviewed the supporting documentation for one early contribution (total population) reported in the Candidate's campaign finance report, and determined the name of the contributor for the contribution was included on the support. For individuals who contributed greater than \$50, we determined that the contributor's address, occupation and employer were also included on the support.

(i) For other types of cash receipts reported in the candidate's campaign finance report, review supporting documentation and review for compliance with regulatory rules and laws and agree the receipt to inclusion in the campaign account bank statement.

No other types of cash receipts were reported in the Candidate's campaign finance reports during the periods reviewed.

(ii) For in-kind contributions, review the supporting documentation and determine the methodology utilized to value the contribution and assess the reasonableness.

Finding

No in-kind contributions were reported in the Candidate's campaign finance reports during the periods reviewed.

- e) Judgmentally select a sample of cash expenditures reported in the candidate's campaign finance report and perform the following:
 - (i) Review supporting invoice or other documentation and agree amount to the amount reported in the candidate's finance report.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed amounts to supporting invoices or other documentation and to the Candidate's finance report, with no exceptions noted.

(ii) Determine that the name, address and nature of goods or services provided agree to the information reported in the candidate's campaign finance report.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed the name, address and nature of goods or services provided to the information reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance report with no exceptions noted, however three of the expenditures tested were made were to family members of the Candidate and the Campaign finance report did not indicate that they were family members. Per the Citizens Clean Elections Act & Rules Manual rule R2-20-701(C)(4), all payments made to family members or to enterprises owned in whole or part by the candidate or a family member shall be clearly itemized and indicated as such in all campaign finance reports.

Agree the amount of the expenditure to the campaign account bank statement.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed amounts to the campaign account bank statements with one exception. The Campaign finance report included a \$264.50 expenditure for newspaper advertising, however this amount was not present on the Campaign bank statement. Per discussion with the Candidate, he paid this vendor in cash, however no petty cash fund had been set up for the Campaign and this expenditure was not reported as a reimbursement to the Candidate on the Campaign finance report.

(iii) Determine whether the expenditure was made for a direct campaign purpose. Direct campaign purpose includes, but is not limited to, materials, communications, transportation, supplies and expenses used toward the election of the candidate.

Finding

We reviewed five expenditures and agreed the name, address and nature of goods or services provided to the information reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance report with no exceptions noted.

If the expenditure is a joint expenditure made in conjunction with other candidates, determine that the amount paid represents the candidate's proportionate share of the total cost.

Finding

None of the expenditures we tested appeared to be for joint expenditures.

f) Determine whether any petty cash funds have been established and, if so, determine how expenditures from these funds have been reflected in the accounting records. Determine whether aggregate petty cash funds exceed the limit of \$1,420.

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Candidate did not establish a petty cash fund during the periods reviewed, however per review of the Campaign bank statement, several ATM withdrawals were made and per discussion with the Candidate, multiple vendors were paid with cash.

(i) If applicable, judgmentally select a sample of expenditures made from the Candidate's petty cash fund(s) and obtain supporting documentation for the expenditure. Determine whether the expenditure was for a direct campaign expense and whether the expenditure was in excess of the \$160 limit on petty cash expenditures.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Candidate did not establish a petty cash fund during the periods reviewed.

g) Determine whether a legal defense fund has been established.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the campaign did not establish a legal defense fund.

(i) If a legal defense fund was established, how were these funds accounted for?

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the campaign did not establish a legal defense fund.

h) Contact the Candidate and/or his or her representative(s) to discuss the preliminary engagement findings and recommendations that the Contractor anticipates presenting to the CCEC. During this conference, the Contractor will advise the Candidate and/or his or her representative(s) of their right to respond to the preliminary findings and the projected timetable for the issuance of the final issuance of the report.

We discussed our findings with the Candidate and the Candidate did not provide responses to our findings.

We were not engaged to and did not conduct an examination, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion on the Pre-Primary and Post-Primary Campaign Finance Reports of Rubalcava for House. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. Had we performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to our attention that would have been reported to you.

We (the Contractor) have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were specified and agreed to by the State of Arizona Citizens Clean Elections Commission (the Commission), solely to assist the Commission in evaluating whether Rubalcava for House (the Candidate), Campaign Finance Reports, Campaign bank account and corresponding documentation for expenditures and contributions for the 2016 election cycle (January 15, 2016 to January 31, 2017) were prepared or maintained in compliance with Title 16, Articles 1 and 2 of the Arizona Revised Statutes, Campaign Contributions and Expenses, and the Citizens Clean Elections Act, and whether the reports complied with the rules of the Citizens Clean Elections Commission. The Candidate provided the Campaign bank statements for all months of the election cycle, however the Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the deposits and withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements. The attached Bank Statement Deposit Summary and Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the deposits and withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

- b) Select 100% of cash disbursements and withdrawals from the campaign bank statement and perform the following:
 - (i) Review supporting invoice or other documentation and agree amount to the amount reported in the candidate's finance report.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

(ii) Determine that the name, address and nature of goods or services provided agree to the information reported in the candidate's campaign finance report.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements, therefore the name, address and nature of goods or services provided could not be agreed to the information reported in the Candidate's Campaign finance report. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

(iii) Determine whether the expenditure was made for a direct campaign purpose. Direct campaign purpose includes, but is not limited to, materials, communications, transportation, supplies and expenses used toward the election of the candidate.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements, therefore expenditures made for a direct Campaign purpose could not be determined. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

• If the expenditure is a joint expenditure made in conjunction with other candidates, determine that the amount paid represents the candidate's proportionate share of the total cost.

Finding

The Candidate indicated that he was unable to identify or locate any documentation supporting the withdrawals from the Campaign bank statements, therefore joint expenditures were unable to be identified. The attached Bank Statement Withdrawal Summary describe the withdrawals noted in the Campaign bank statements.

c) Determine whether a legal defense has been established.

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Campaign did not establish a legal defense.

(i) Has any Clean funding been used to pay for legal services?

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Campaign did not establish a legal defense.

(ii) What is the cost or value of legal services being provided for the comprehensive audit and review of the finance activity?

Finding

Based on inquiry of the Candidate, the Campaign did not establish a legal defense.

I would like to start off by thanking you for the opportunity to participate as a participating candidate in the 2016 Election Cycle. Please acknowledge that I am not by any means challenging the results of the review, nor am I denying any wrong doing. More so, this is acknowledgement that my campaign finances were not effectively run and that my lesson has been learned. Moving forward, should I be given the opportunity, I now know what to do and what not to do. This letter is to explain and clarify some questions you may have in regards to the issues and concerns brought before you.

It is important to know that this was my first time running for such position. I had never had to file full campaign accounts and never had to form a committee for the purpose of running for office. Many things I did not know. For example, I did not know that I needed to set up a petty cash account. I did not know where or how to disclose family members that worked for my campaign. I did not know that I needed to hire legal counsel. I did call the Citizens Clean Elections Commission office twice to ask for 1) what or how much to pay individuals working for the campaign and 2) where to obtain a mileage reimbursement form. I did not receive a concrete answer for either questions, rather was told to attend the CCEC Orientation again. Again, this is not justification or an excuse.

The biggest issue with my campaign was that I used my bank account that linked with my campaign account. For example, I would deposit a check into what I thought was one account and it would end up

in another. Another example, I would use my campaign debit card for a transaction and it would

withdraw from my personal account. Because this was so confusing to me, I began to use the filing

report with the Secretary of State as my accounting and balance.

I was not able to provide additional documentation other than my bank statements for the following

reason. I am a Special Education teacher in the Buckeye Elementary School District. When going through

my initial audit, I had all of my campaign documents in my classroom. Over holiday break, I was moved

into different classrooms 2 times. During this time, many of my personal belongings and documents

were misplaced. I still have not been able to relocate them.

I ask the commission to please consider the reasoning for such flaws in this campaign finance. I accept

the report on findings as a way to acknowledge and learn from what was done incorrectly and how to

do things the correct way. I am willing to accept the consequences of my wrongdoing and ask that the

commission allow me to take corrective actions in order to comply; whether this be repaying back any

unaccounted monies and fees set forth by the commission.
